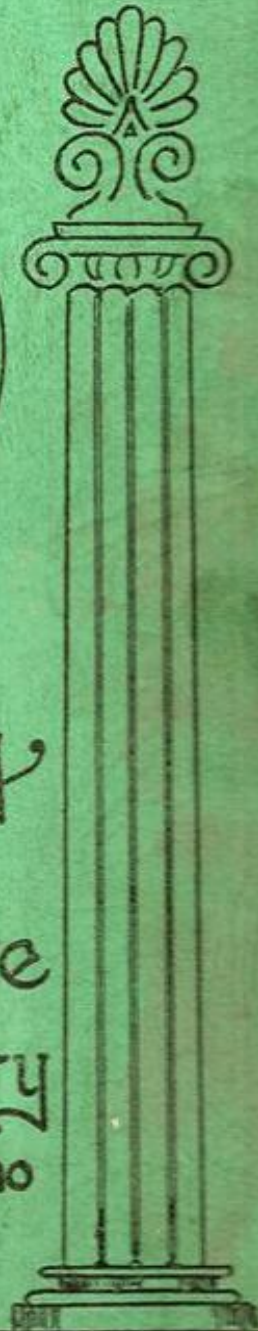

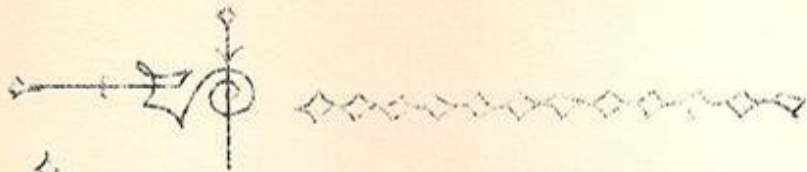

Subservient to thy Son.

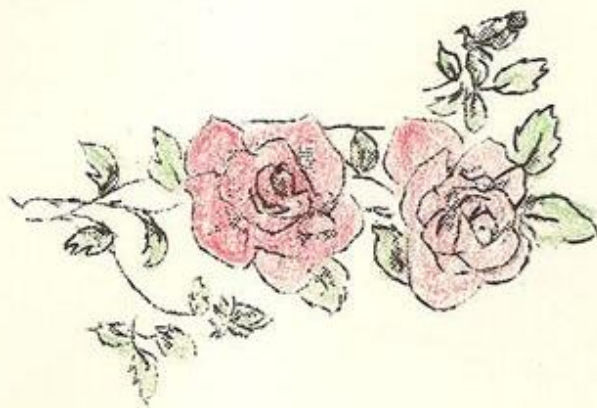


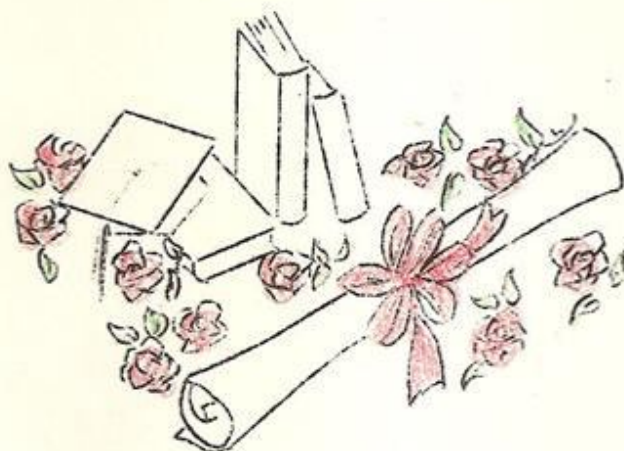


# DEDICATION

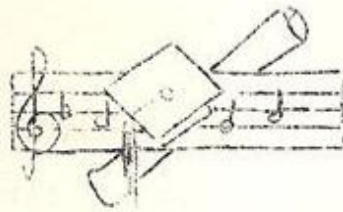
## Congratulations

We face life without a dread.



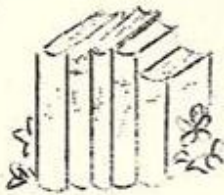
## THE GRADUATE

# Class History

Timid souls that we were, we quaked for weeks in anticipation of the coming initiation. Soon that was over and we could breathe with more ease. We began to feel like normal human beings. The lessons weren't too difficult---the Latin, Algebra and Biology---for under the guidance of Sister M. Bernarda, we overcame all difficulties. There were many interesting interruptions, too. Holidays, Biology hikes, candy sales, exciting adventures with mice and frog legs, the Junior Prom, when we really felt as if we belonged to this High School department---these were some of the high lights. Then came the High School picnic, our trip to Liberty Lake, the excitement of it all. Then those examinations which were to prove whether or not we would be wise Sophomores in the following September.

Several new faces were in the crowd and a few familiar faces were absent. With some knowledge and sense of responsibility, (we thought) we took our places. Our number was now seventeen. Under the supervision of Sister M, Austin we learned the feudal system, we fought in Caesar's Gallic Wars and we grew wiser as the year progressed.

Junior Class--that was the sign posted over the door across the street. We were now upperclassmen. How eagerly we looked at the typewriters, but we didn't realize that we had so many thumbs until we sat before the typewriter. However, under the patient training of Sister M. Charisse, we soon mastered the technique of typewriting and the symbols of shorthand. In our social life there is no doubt but that the event of events was the Prom. How we planned, how we worked, what fun we had and what a big success it was. Then the Junior play, "Don't Take My Penny", another highlight. About this time a huge paper drive was on way. Papers, magazines, tons of them were collected. It was in our Junior year that we lost three members of our class. Three boys from our class who were soon to be eighteen and who were to make enough credits to graduate left with the class of 1944. Only one more door was left for us to enter.

Seniors at last, thirteen girls and three boys. The usual series of events--Class elections, initiation of the



Freshman, football games, Halloween masquerade, the Christmas play, "The Toymaker", midyear examinations. Thus ended the first semester. It was in February that one of our members answered the call of Uncle Sam. James Tunnell received his call to report for the service on February 26. St. Patrick's Day brought the play, "Bits of Blarney". Then perhaps, the greatest event for the girls was the Senior Junior retreat. Not to be forgotten will be the trip to Spokane to the photographer, the Sodality breakfast, the Silver Tea at which we were guests of the Mothers Club, the Progressive Dinner, the preparing of the annual, the 7th War Loan Drive, the picnic, the novena for Mother's Day, the May queen contest and the May crowning. Then our final examinations which will give us a passport from the Senior Classroom---then the crowning of all---Graduation.

We are about to close the door of our Senior year. Four full years we have had--full of kindly interest on the part of the Sisters, full of learning and Christian training, full of friendly associations of our companions.

As we close the last door we can truly say, "What opportunities have been ours."

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## Called to the Service

The second half of James Tunnell's Senior year was cut short by an invitation which he found in his mail box one February afternoon. The invitation was from no other than Uncle Sam. Each day Jim marked one more day from the calendar till finally February 26 arrived.

Previous to his leaving a surprise party was planned. An enjoyable evening was spent and a delicious lunch of cakes and icecream and coffee was served. The cakes, made by Mrs. Mylan, were especially good. The Seniors then presented Jim with a Ditty bag.

We were very sad to see Jim leave and we know that he would have liked to remain with us a few more months. However, he is still with us in spirit and we shall look forward to the day that he returns to Coeur d' Alene.

The hour will soon arrive---the hour, when for the forty-first time, a group of eager boys and girls will graduate from the Academy.

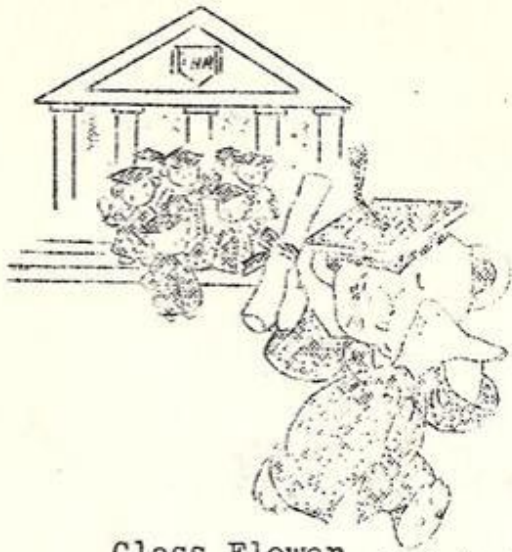

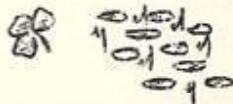


# BITS O' BLARNEY

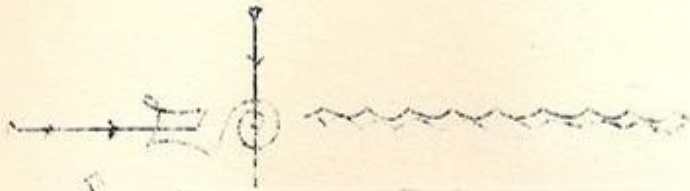


# THE SUNSHINE TWINS

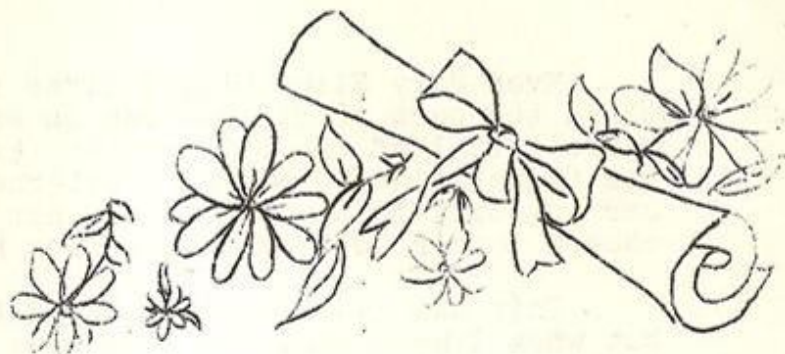
The many humorous escapades of the twins in their effort to brighten up a very unusual home life furnished many laughs.

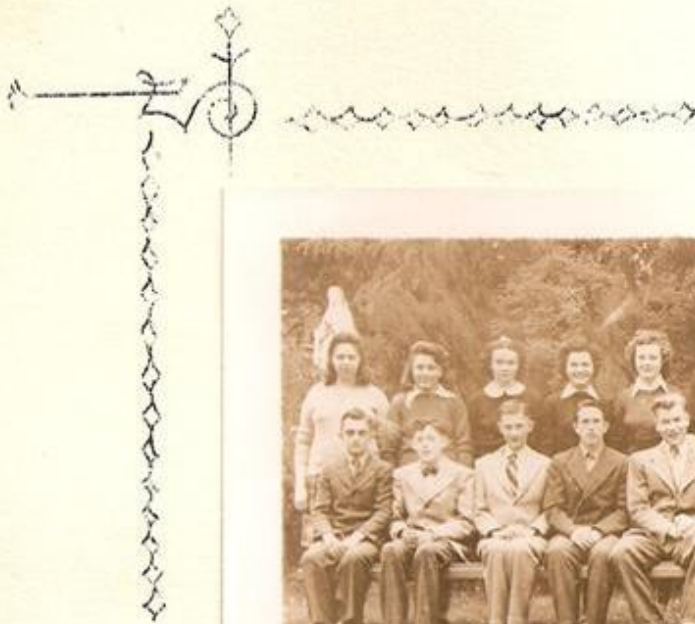
In the "Toy Maker", the Christmas Play, and "Bits O'Blarney" presented in March, we were able to show some dramatic ability.

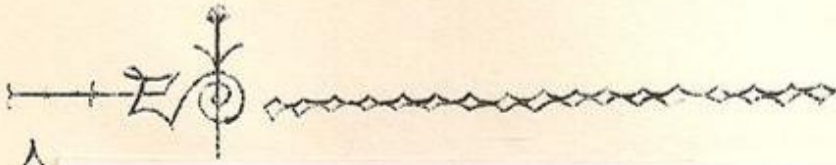

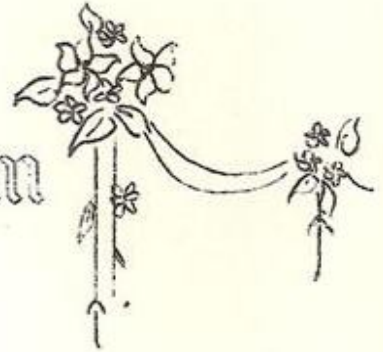

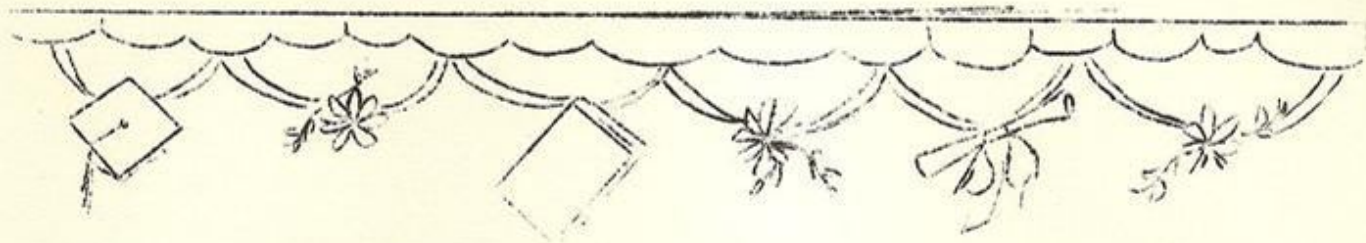
Donald Bixel met his death very suddenly on Saturday afternoon, March 24, while playing on Tubb's Hill with some of his classmates.

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
