All Catholic Award, the highest rating given to individual yearbooks was awarded to the 1947 issue of the Le Coeur. This annual survey is conducted by the Catholic School Press Association at the Marquette University College of Journalism.

The annuals were rated as follows:

Diffusion of Catholic thought and Activity-----300
points

Enterprise and service to school and community-----200
points

Editorial content-----125 points

Uniformity and consistency of style-----100 points

Headline construction and accuracy----- 75 points

Application of art to news or features-- 50 points

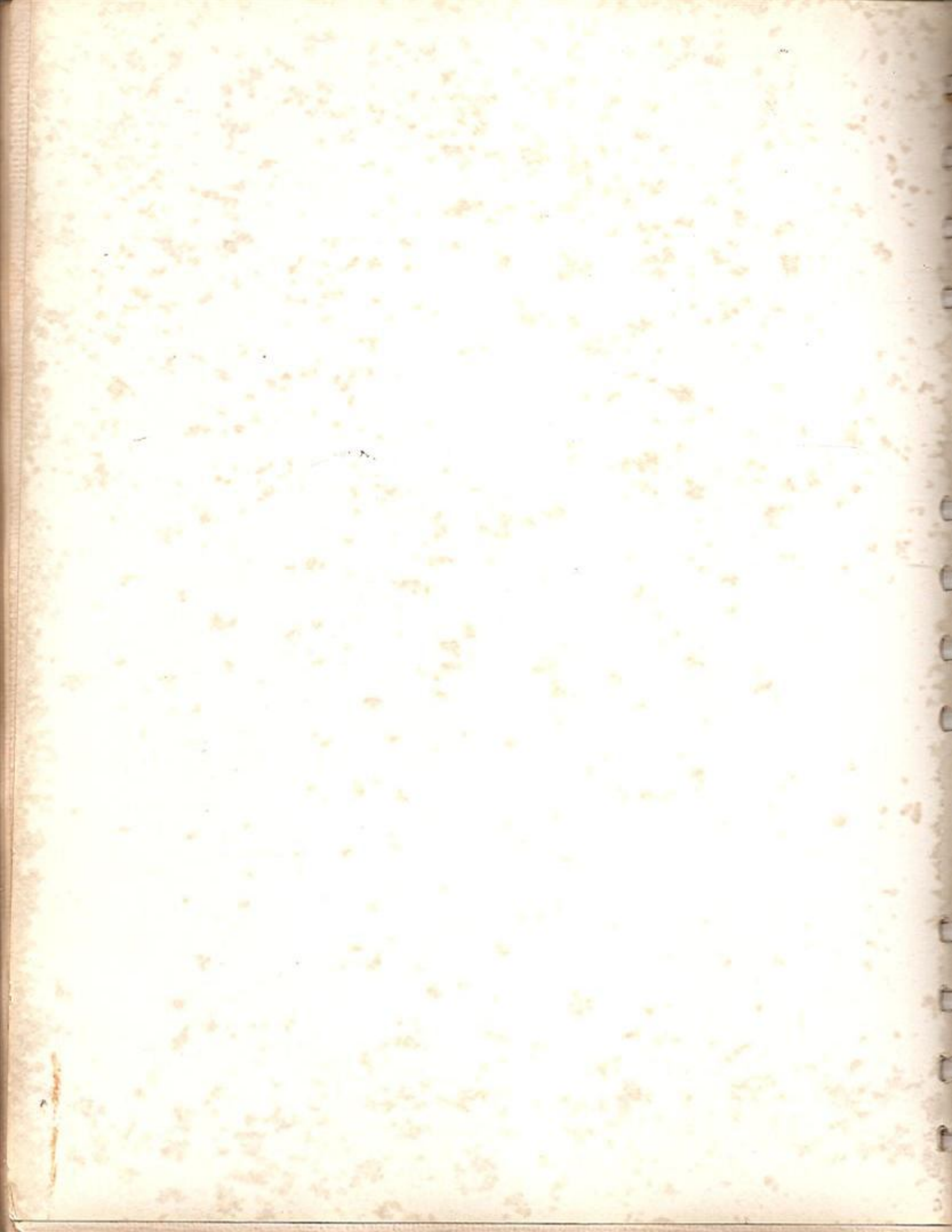

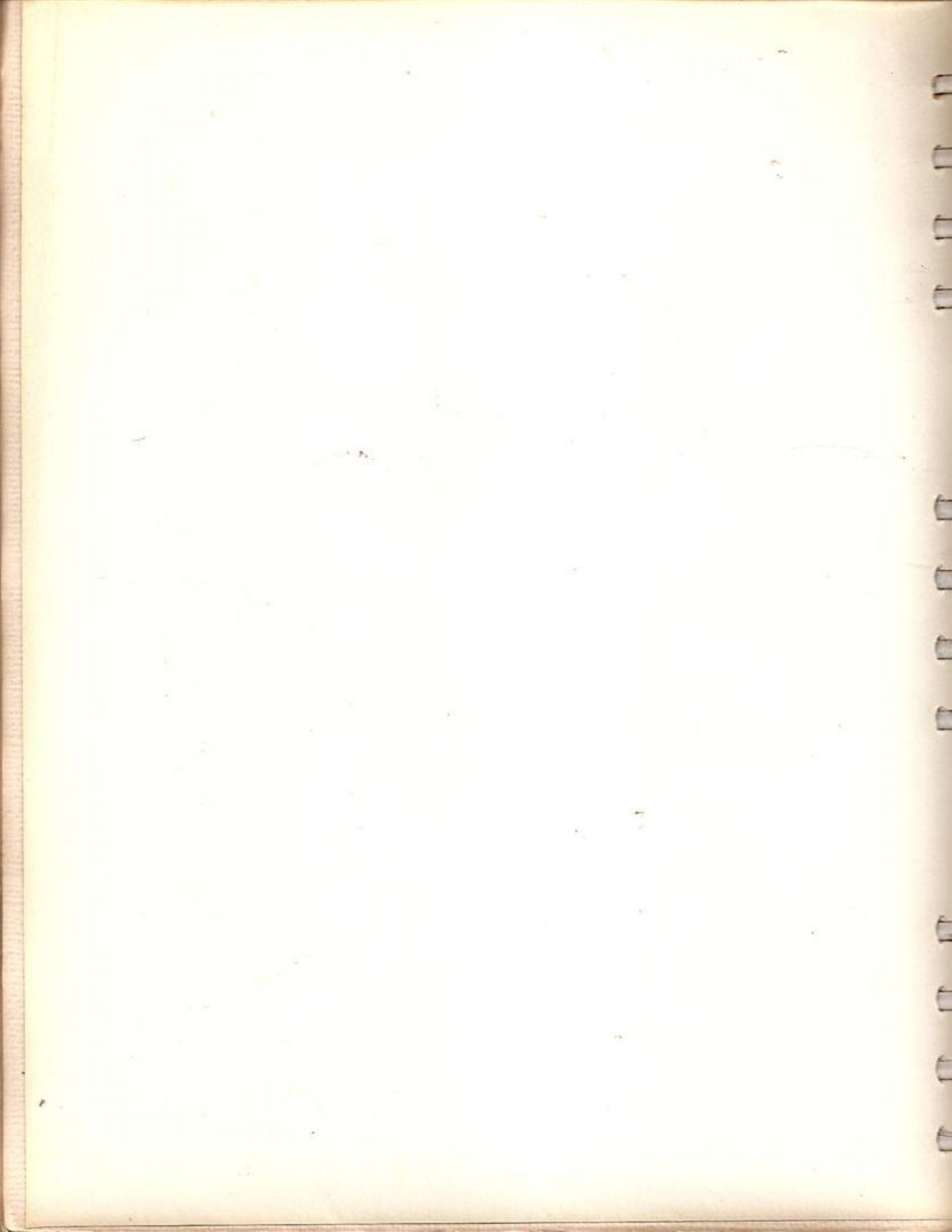

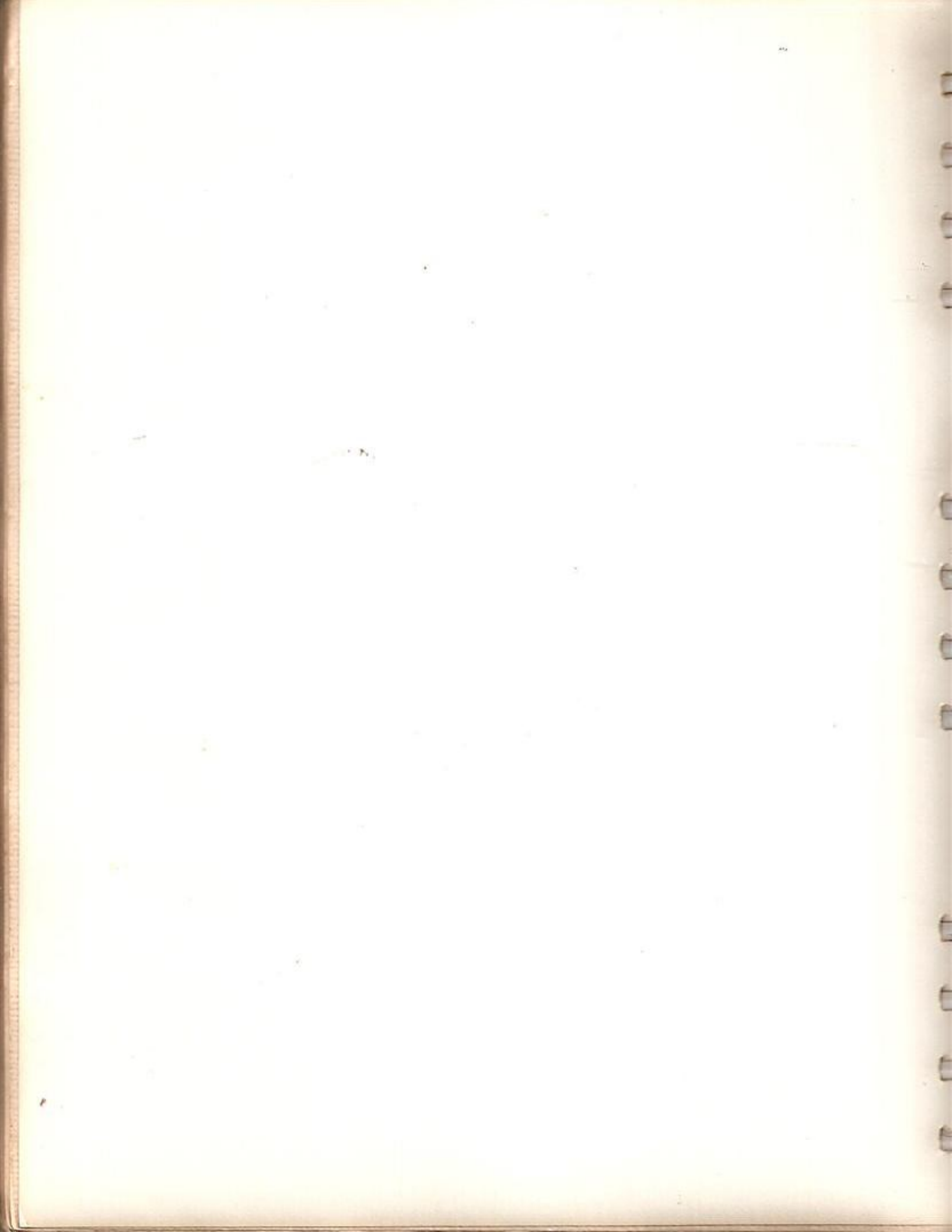

WILD ROSE IS SPRING MUSICAL

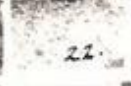
Last performance given by the dramatics class was a musical comedy, "Wild Rose", written by Charles George, presented April 9, in the auditorium.

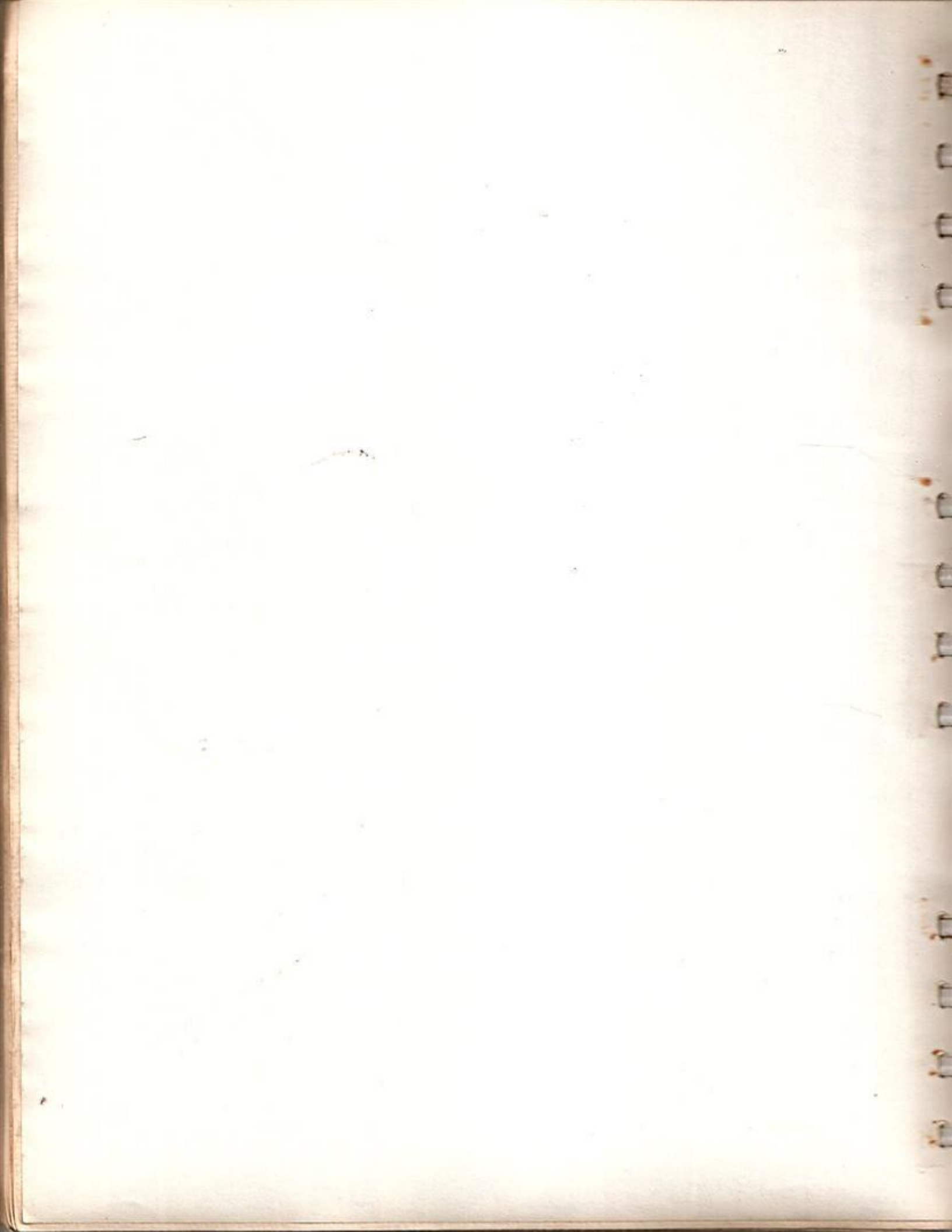

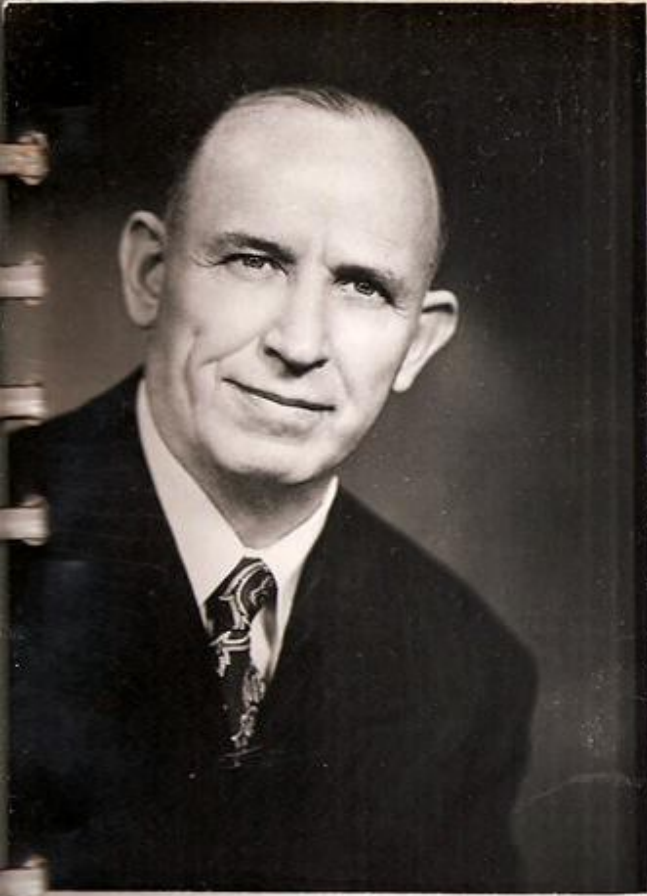
Congratulations to Mr. and Mrs. Sheldon J. MacMillan and their daughter Jane, a member of this year's graduating class.
