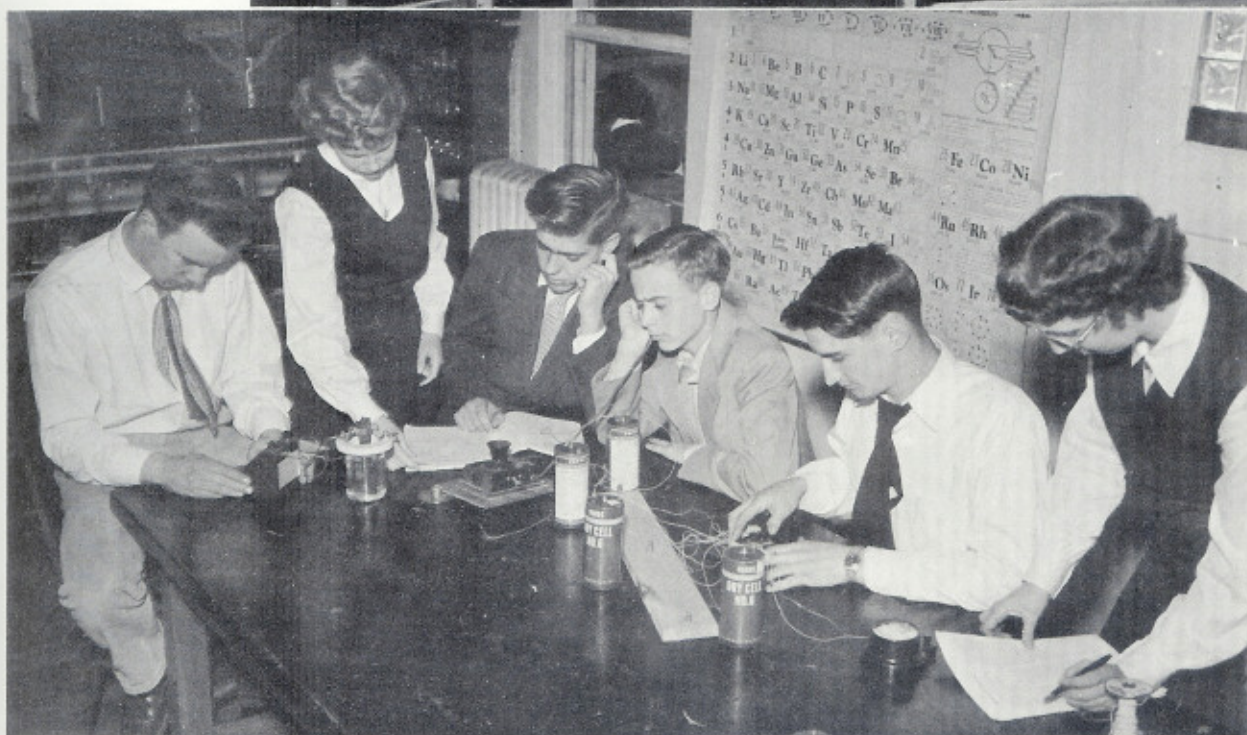
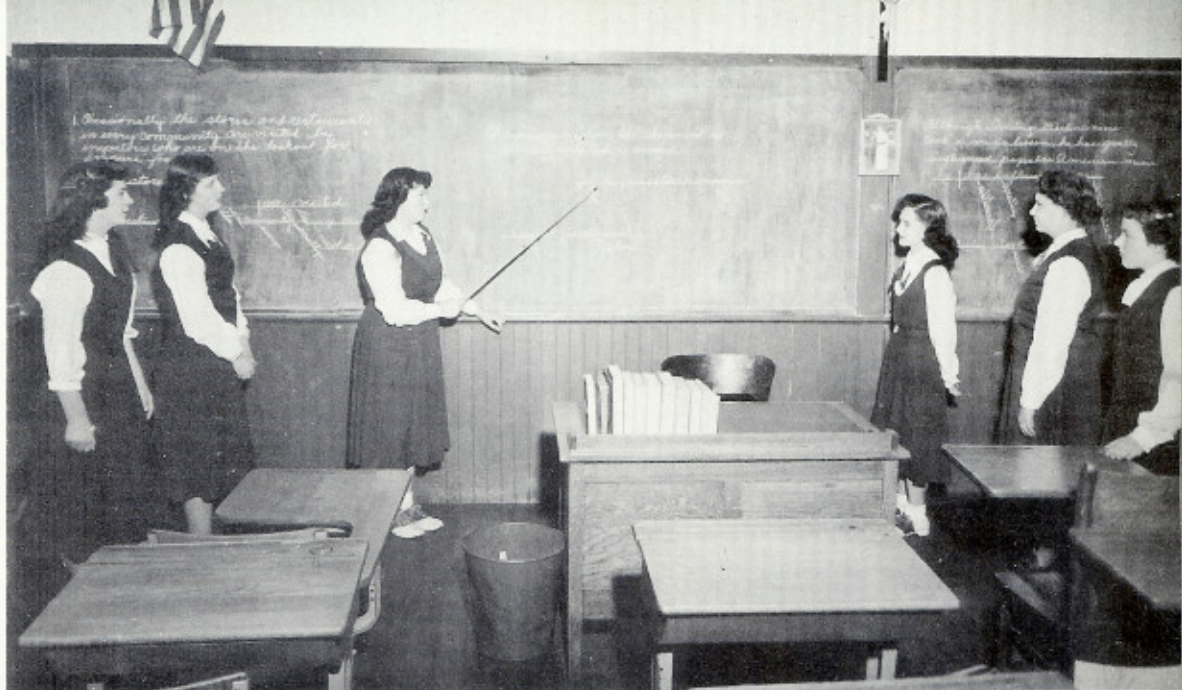

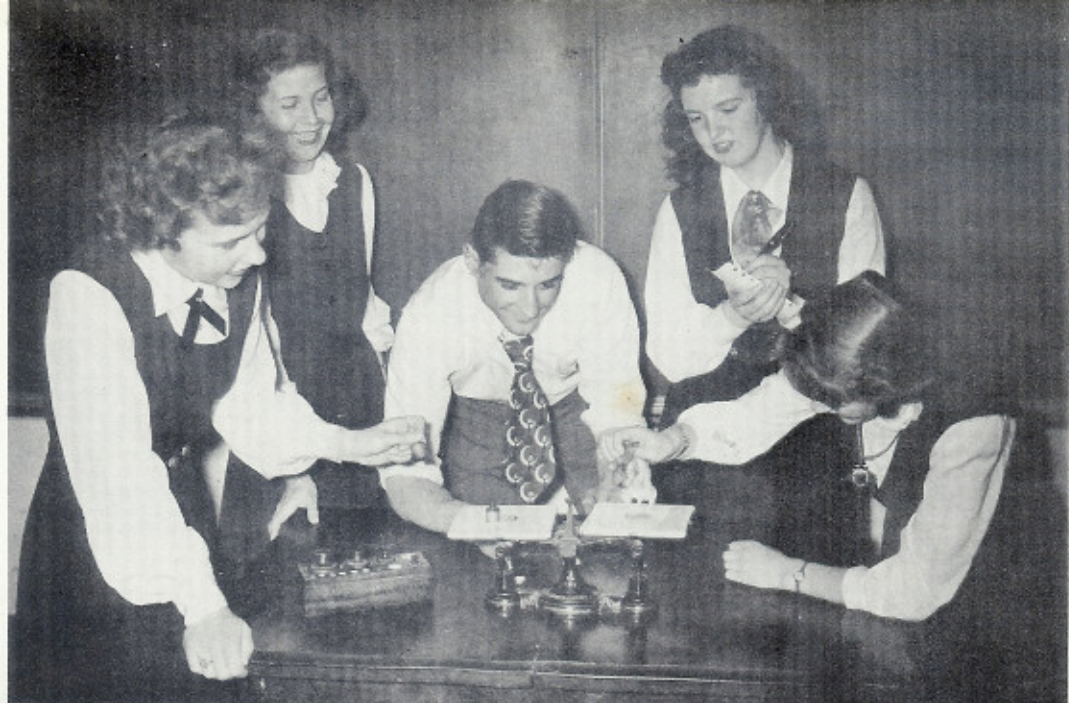

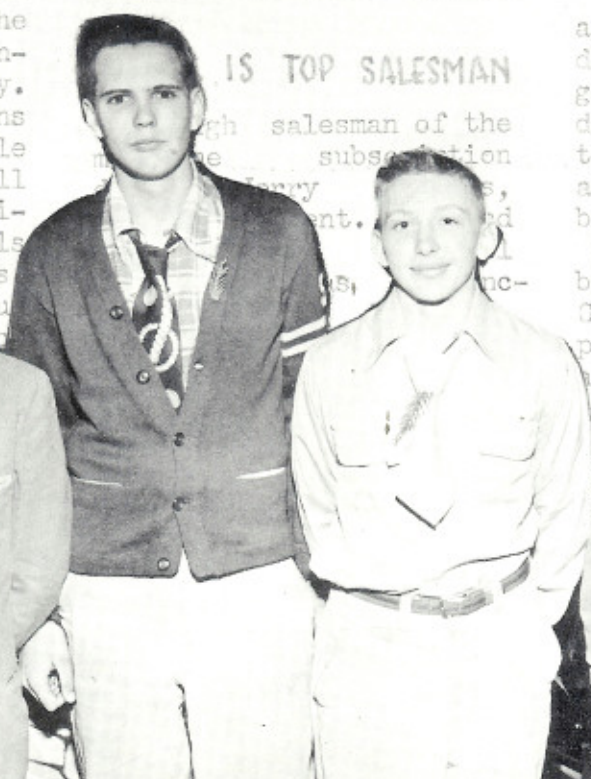
COMPETE IN CATHOLIC TOURNAMENT

During the month of May, sodalists gather at Our Lady's beautiful shrine in the Academy yard to recite the rosary in her honor.

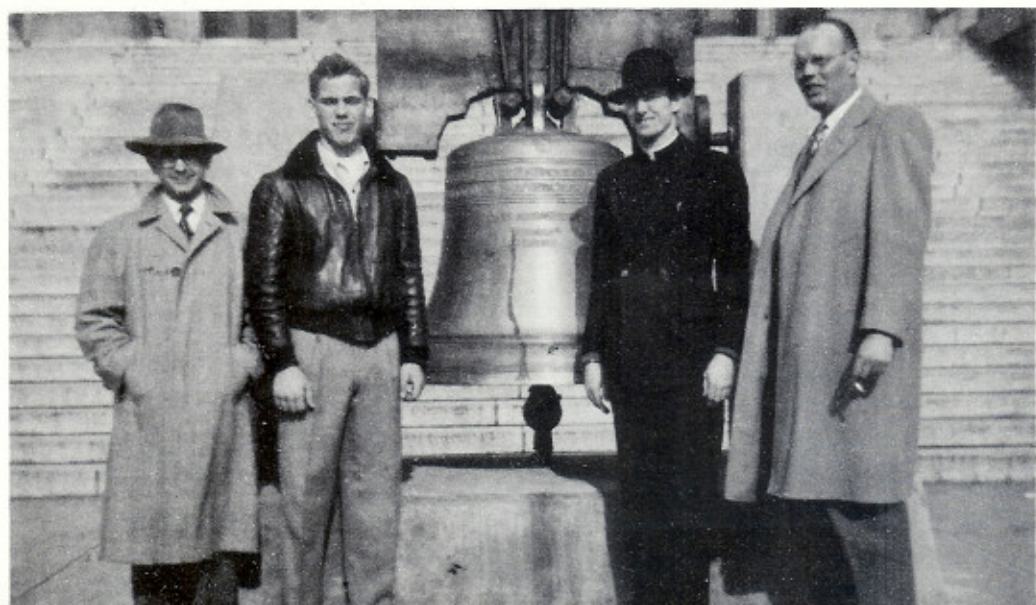
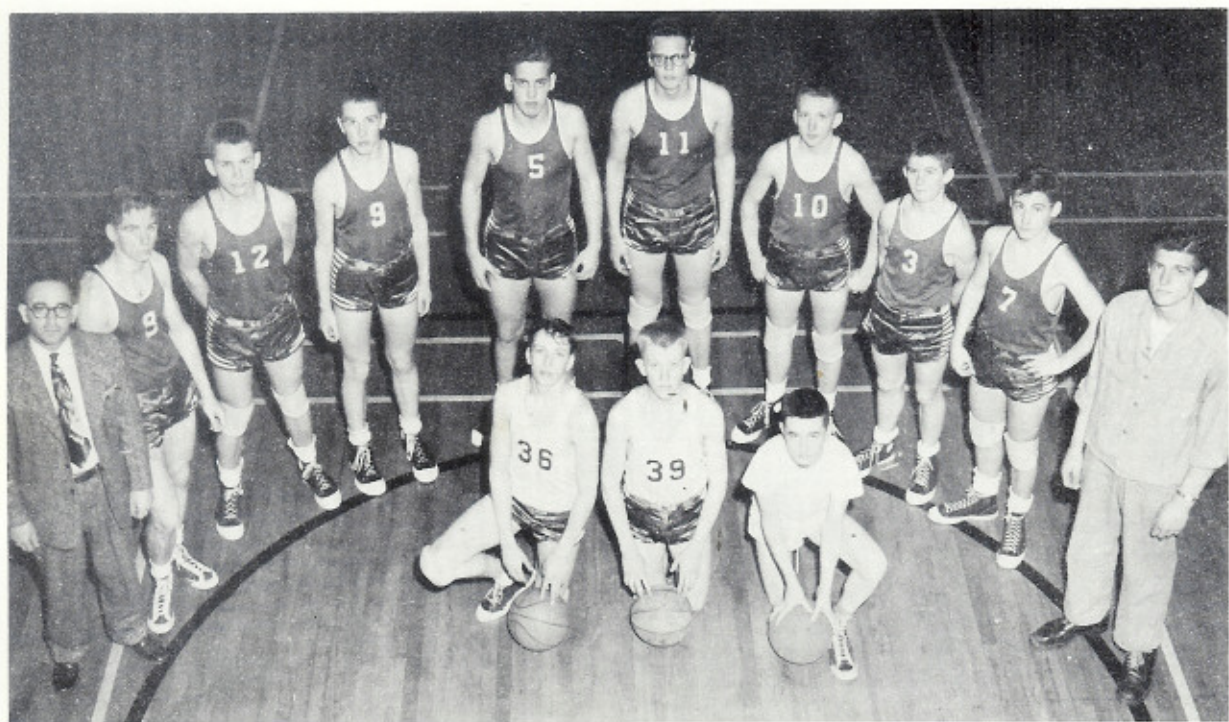
Sodality girls offered to take care of small children during the novena service in order that parents could attend the novena.

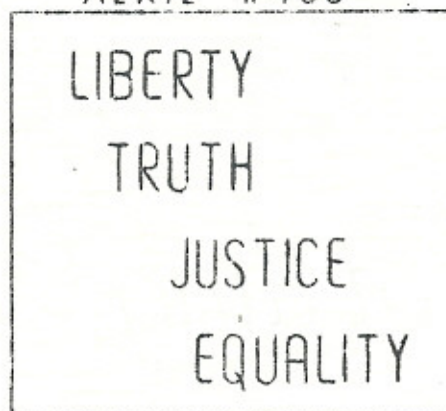

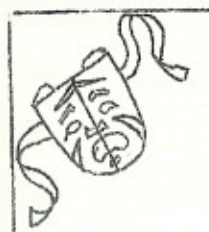

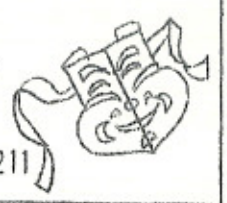
