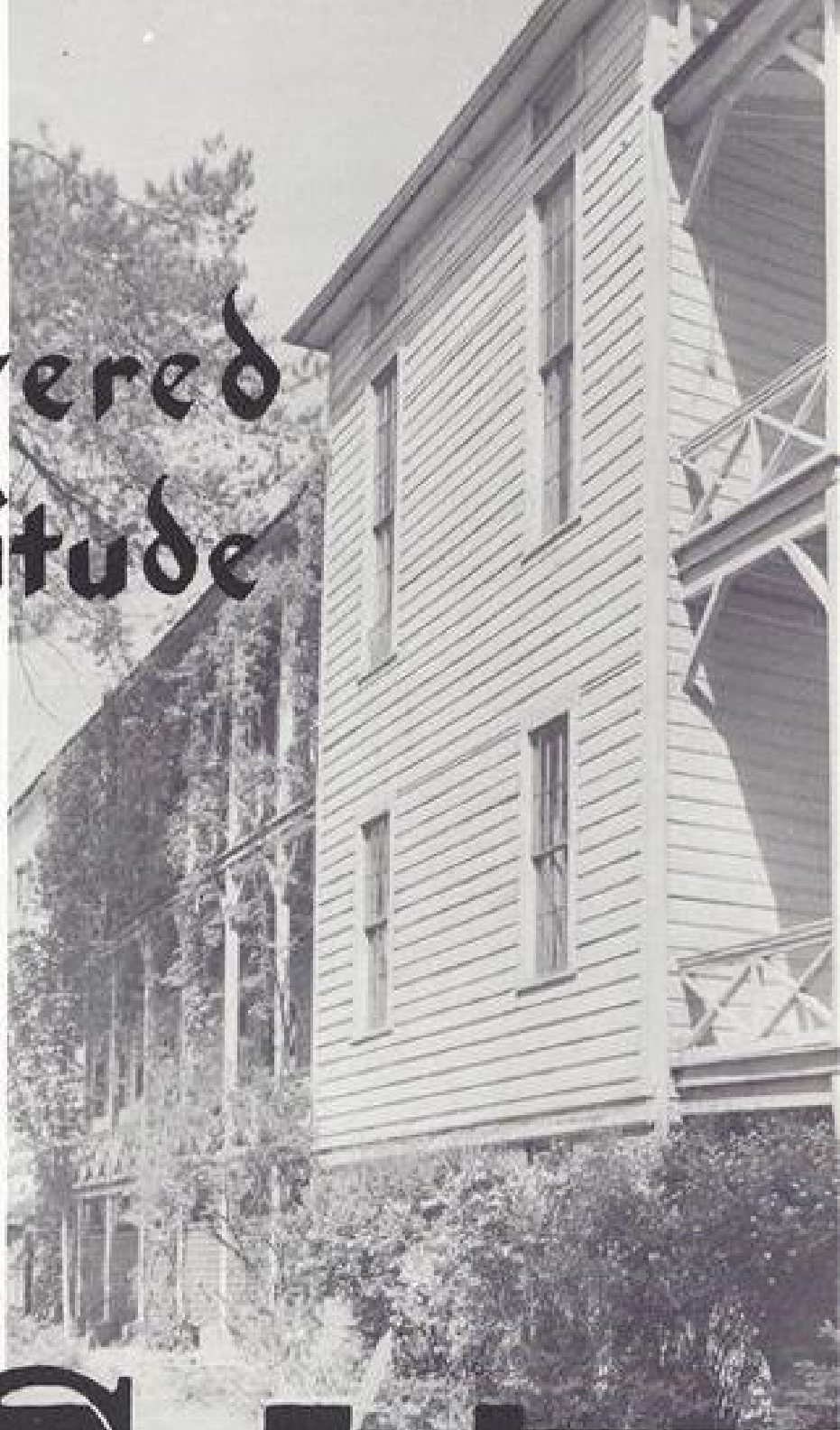

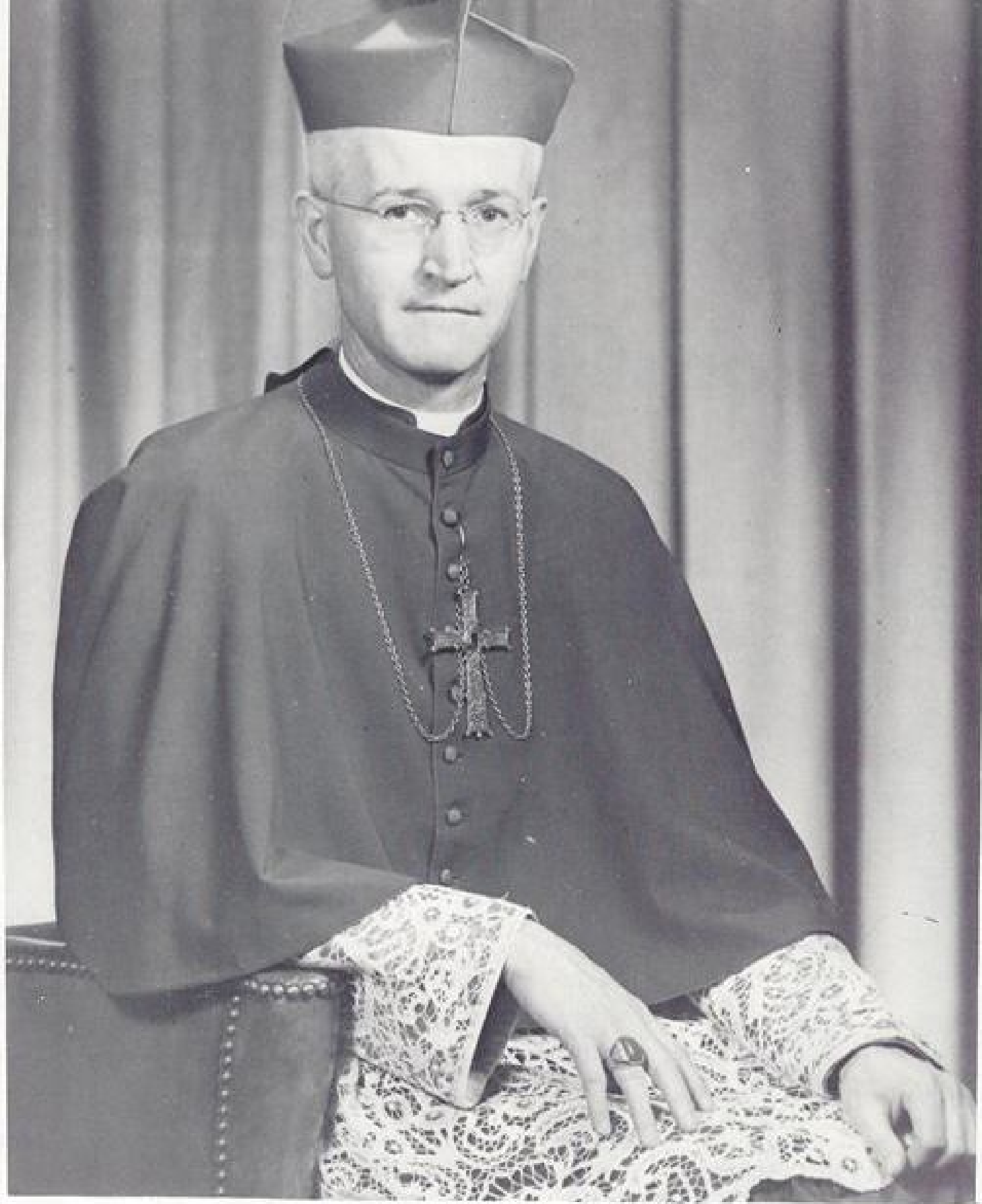

Dear Graduates:

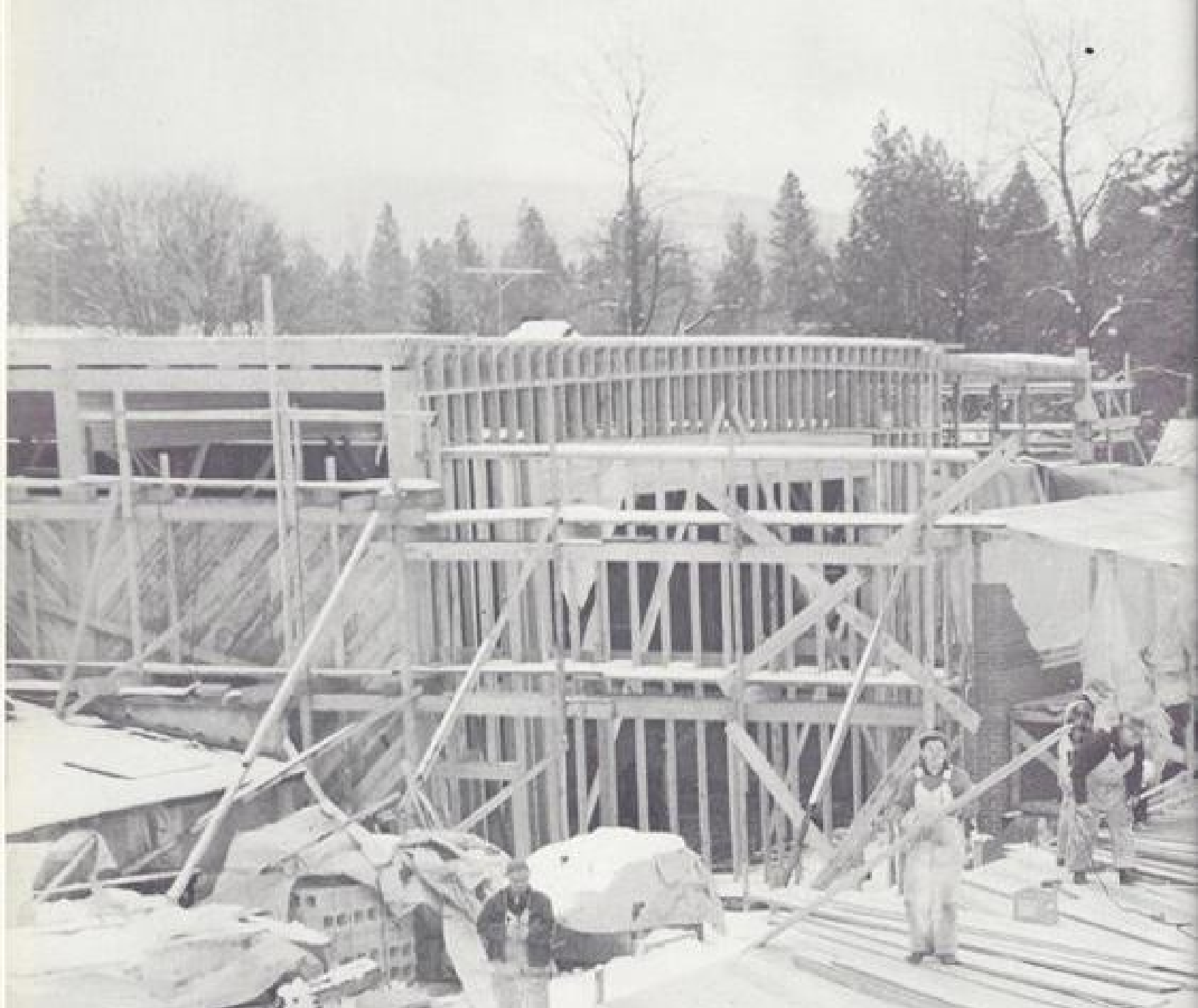

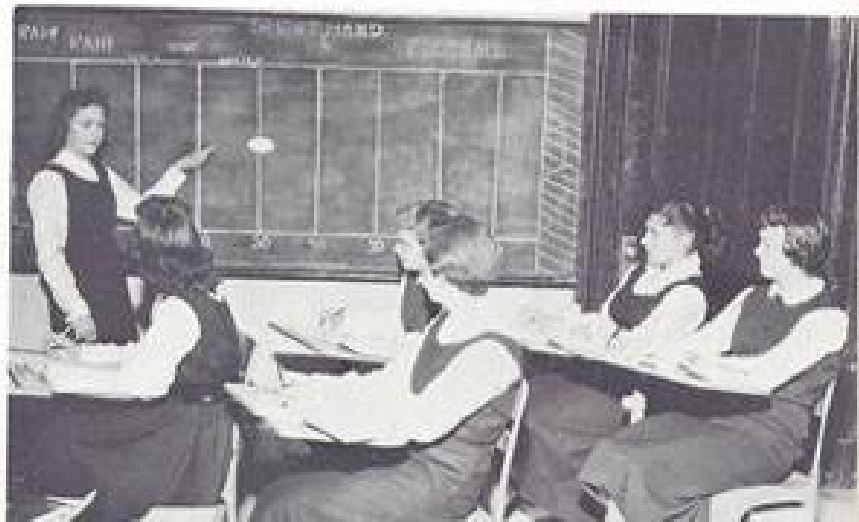

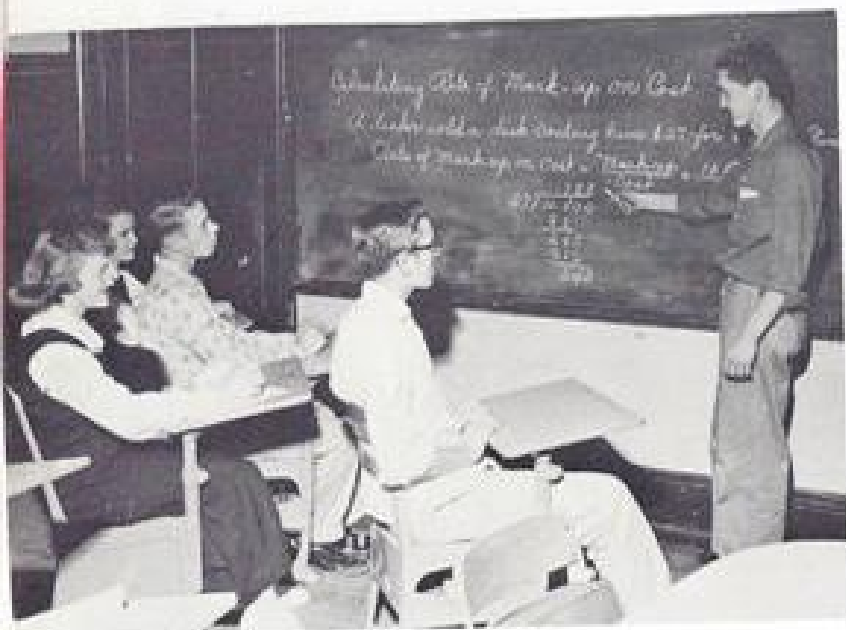

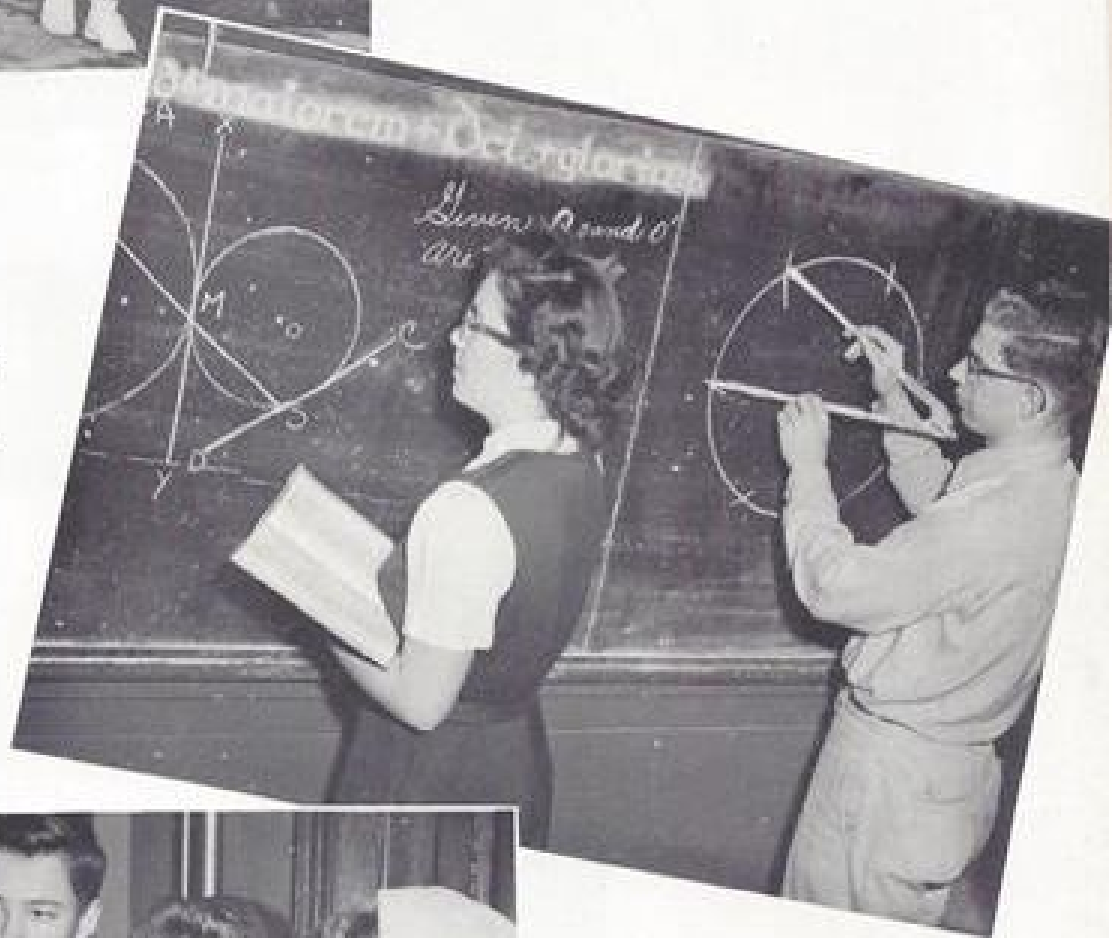

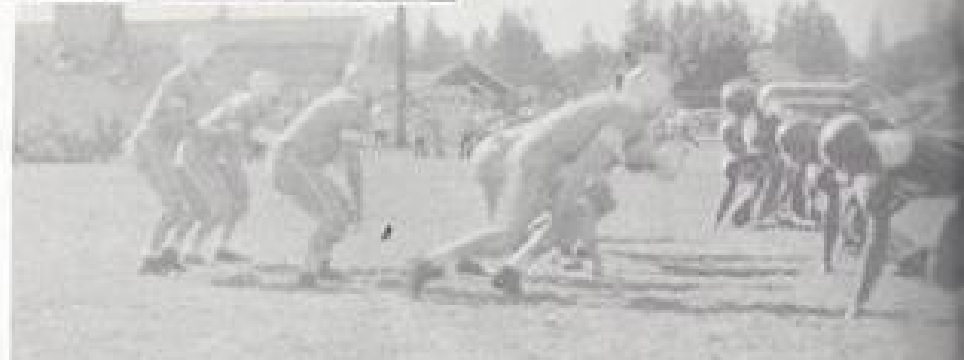
# LAKE CITY TEAM CLAIMS TOP MARK

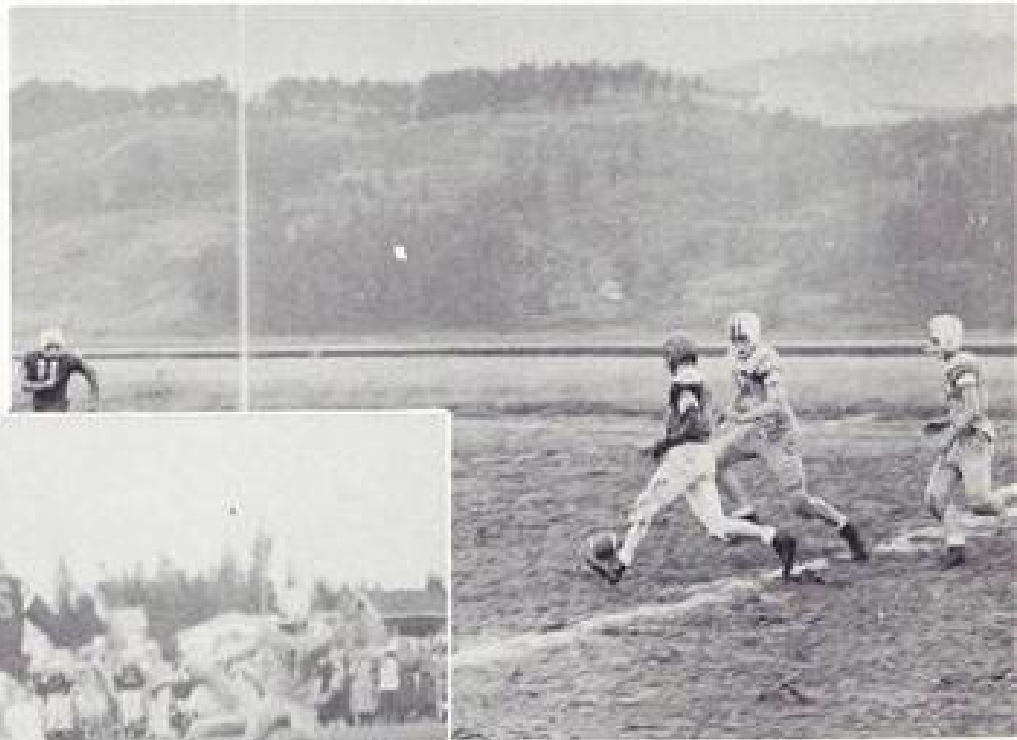

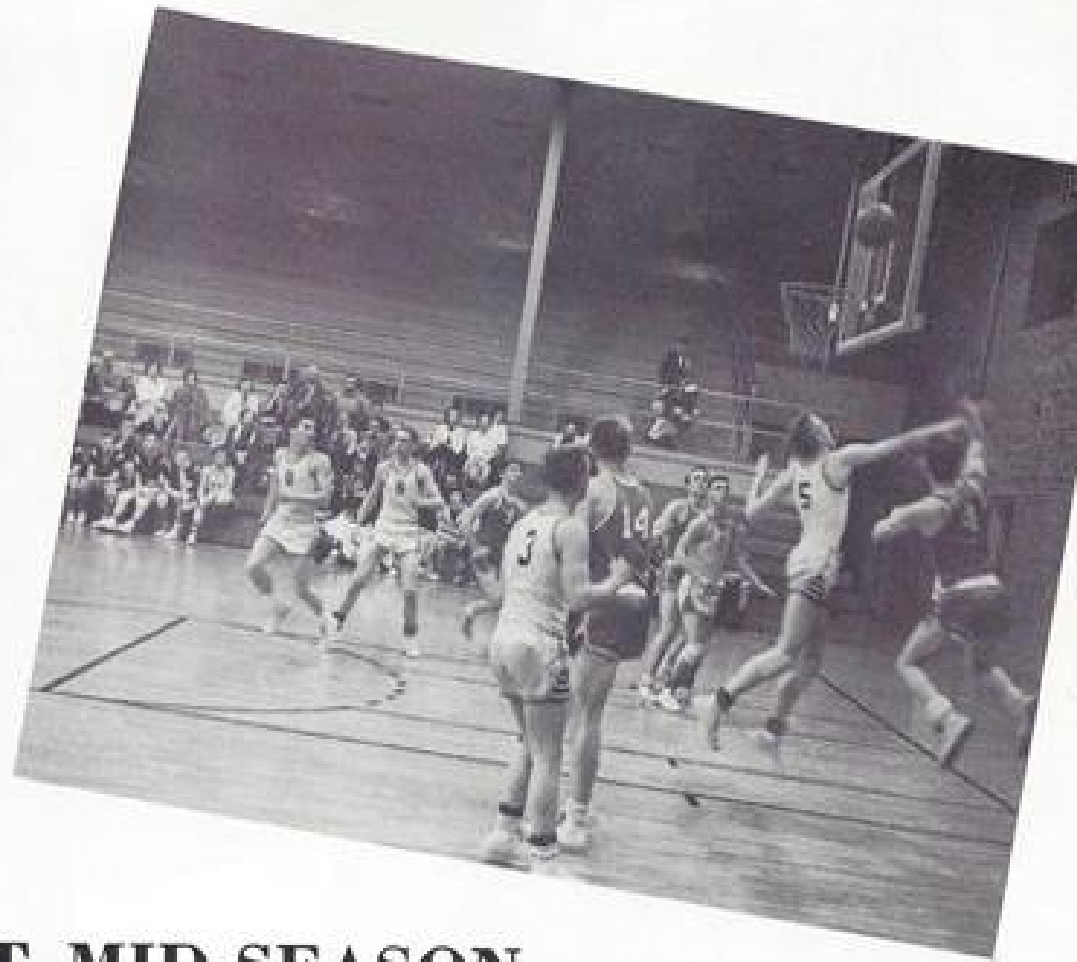
