# Class History

The Class of '61, more appropriately known as the "No-More-Nothing-Class," has throughout the past four years zestfully entered into all of I.H.M.'s traditional doings, such as Fall Festivals, Latin classes, Sister M. Kevina's own personal initiation, Homecoming Dances, Sophomore-Senior parties, production of THE LAUREL and of a LE COEUR, Junior Proms, Senior Balls, and press conferences. This class history is an endeavor to perpetuate for posterity all the unique and unprecedented achievements of the Class of '61. And since there will be no more traditions (for the No-More-Nothing-Class has, by its "never knowing when enough is enough" jeopardized most of I.H.M.'s old traditions), these here recorded incidents may well be the NEW traditions of I.H.M.

The Class of '61 has had the distinction of christening two new buildings, St. Thomas Grade School and the I.H.M. Academy--not with the customary champagne, but with blood, sweat, and tears. In fact, the high school was so new that there were no lockers for the first three months.

Initiation must have deeply scarred the impressionable little frosh in 1957, so notoriously did they, as seniors, administer the 1960 rites (which, as intimated above, may well be the last initiation at I.H.M...)

As one of the indelible marks imprinted on I.H.M. by the Class of '61, an Irish jig was performed by the frosh femmes fatales to add flavor to St. Patrick's Day, 1958.

Dear to the hearts of all seniors of '61 are the memories of their freshman proms. Sister M. Kevina conducted her usual raffle of feminine names to help reluctant boys choose a partner, and of course there were the smiling chaperones...

As freshmen, the Class of '61 was a part of the I. H. M. caravan that went afoot, one bright fall day, to see "The Ten Commandments" at the old Roxy Theater. Naturally a few errant souls strayed from the beaten path--as far as the Brunswick; and later back at school, storm clouds hung low over the heads of the recaptured escapees.

The sophomore year, spent with lively Sister M. Spiritus as homeroom teacher, was accented by an encore of the immortal St. Patrick's Day Irish jig and the Sophomore-Senior party with its theme, "If Dreams Came True" spelled out on a giant scale with napkins stuffed in chicken wire--a Class of '61 specialty. The Soph-Senior party was the scene of one of I. H. M.'s most scandalous crimes. The soph boys made away with a good portion of the food and devoured it ~~at~~ Holzer's Hide-out.

The sophomores that year made and dedicated part of I. H. M.'s heritage--the Christmas wreaths that still adorn the windows every Yuletide.

Biology class inspired not so much scientific zeal as collector's mania, and biology lab turn-outs, such as fish eyeballs and frog eardrums, were the treasures.

The sophs also attended their first in a long series of press conferences. Trips to Gonzaga and the University of Idaho for journalistic meets--and the fun that was sure to be had--are high on the Class of '61's memory list.

The junior year brought the privilege of being known as "upperclassmen" and also brought Sister M. Teresine as homeroom teacher. The junior boys "hit the big time" and played varsity sports for the first time.

Another first was the courageous old school bus that was rehabilitated to transport team and Pep Club to out-of-town games. Merrily it rolled down the highway every weekend, the strains of "Give a cheer, give a cheer..." emitting from within. Apparently the old vehicle couldn't take the use and abuse of I.H.M.'s ball players and fans, for it was retired from service the following year.

Also, in their junior year, the boys made their debut into society. Drawn out of their 16-year old cocoons, the "fellas" attended the first "integrated" parties, held by their feminine classmates who for the first time deviated from the traditional "hen party."



In the glittering world of the theater, Mrs. Boughton's eleventh grade thespians starred in Gilbert & Sullivan's renowned satire, "The Mikado" and in the blood-curdling, hair-raising suspense masterpiece, "Khufu". The juniors' dramatic talent was also employed in the Christmas choral reading, "To You, A Savior" and in the spring play, "The Ghosts Go West."

The Junior Prom motif, "Blue Hawaii", was carried out by orchids caught up in fish nets, a pastel sunset (chicken wire stuffed with napkins, to be sure), swaying palms -- plus REAL fish, REAL water, and REAL sand, all over L. V. Brown gym. (Unfortunately Principal Mother M. Rebecca was in the East at the time of "Blue Hawaii.") Prom Queen Sharon O'Connell sat in a sea shell throne in the middle of the sandy South Sea Island.

The juniors honored the seniors at the traditional Junior-Senior dinner in a not-so-traditional way. Carloads of juniors and seniors scurried back and forth between the wide-open spaces of the Anderson residence to the shelter of the Rarick home, to avoid an uninvited guest--rain--and still enjoy the carefully planned lawn party. Highlights of the evening were: playing badminton in the rain, chasing horses in the rain, dancing in the garage because it was raining, toasting marshmallows in the rain, and contact lens-hunting in the rain. No help to the already dampened spirits were the frosh boys who ravaged the party with water bombs.

Coming at last to the senior year, under the homeroom guidance of Sister M. Barbara, Homecoming was observed as never before. A two-day marathon, it was reigned over by Homecoming Queen Mary Dell Rarick. The first night's celebration consisted of I. H. M.'s first bonfire and blocks-long serpentine; the next night's festivities culminated with the royal coronation of the fair queen and dancing in her gymnasium court. Another unforgettable in the athletic scope was the football team's historical trip to Orville, Washington. When half of the 400 miles were covered, the bus ran out of water; but the Panthers saved the day, forming a bucket brigade up and down a precipitous mountain to a stream.

The Senior Ball, "Somewhere Over the Rainbow" could have been more accurately named "Somewhere UNDER the Rainbow", for the 40-foot long, 20-foot high (stuffed chicken wire) rainbow towered above castles, clouds, and snow-capped peaks, as it hung precariously wired to the gym ceiling.

The Coeur d'Alene Democratic Rally was the occasion of an afternoon "off" for I.H.M. members of the student body escorted Democratic congressional candidates to the dedication of the new freeway in patriotically decorated cars.

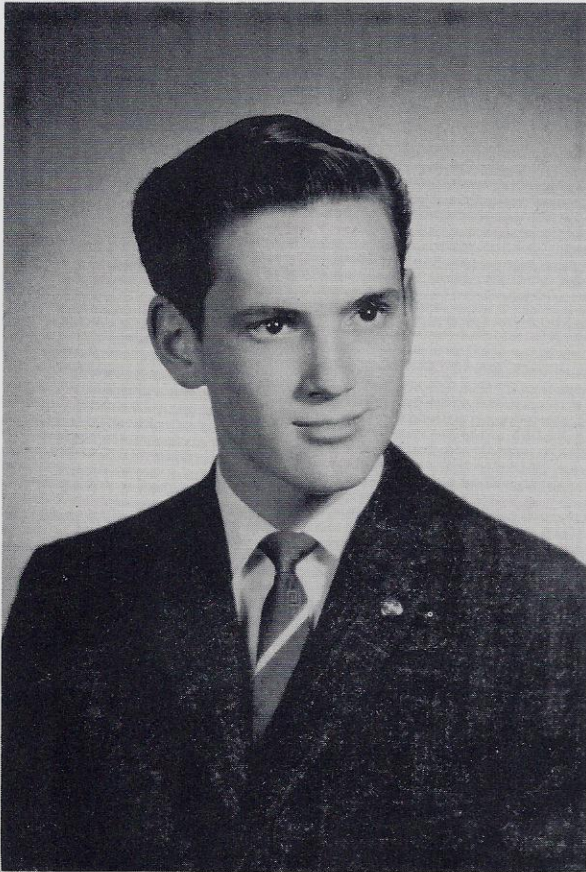
Again the annual Christmas pageant, this year a Bethlehem story, "His Star", was brightly studded with senior talent; as was Mrs. B.'s spring production "Flight into Danger."

Class of '61 pace setters did not fall short of their customary originality in the fads they propagated. Senior girls adopted the use of "eye shadow sticks" in all the colors of the rainbow--plus a few never seen before. The boys retaliated with pipe smoking, and first on their 1960 Christmas list was pipe and pouch.

Never let it be said that the seniors were not "gentlemen and scholars." A proof may be needed to uphold the first contention, but as to their being scholars, there is no question. Many long weeks did they toil to master immortal "MacBeth" in Mother M. Rebecca's "English and related subjects class." No doubt the words "Tomorrow and tomorrow and tomorrow..." and "What, you egg!" will always stir deep delightful memories in the hearts of the Class of '61.

The Class of '61's senior year could be called a premature class reunion. Members lost and gained and lost again over the years are, with few exceptions, together once again to graduate. Now, all assembled in one mighty mass, their high school class history completed, they prepare to go forth and place their imprint upon world history.

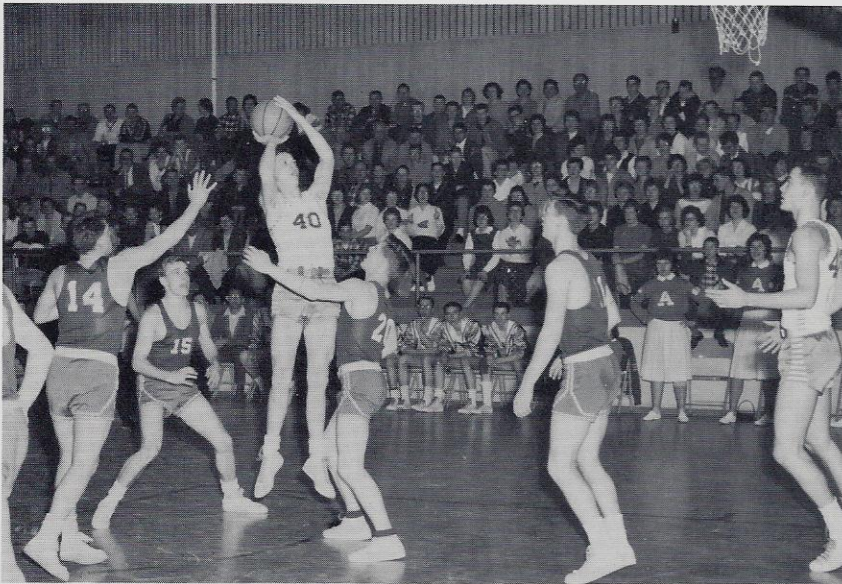

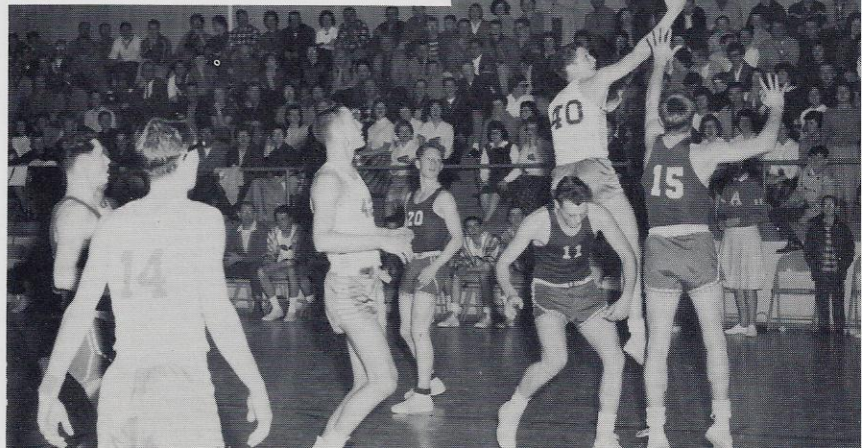
