

2. To make the act of consecration to Our Lady and St. Alphonsus. This may be made


Plenary Indulgences

The conditions for all the above indulgences are: Confession, Holy Communion. Visit to the church where the Confraternity is established, with prayers for intention of the Pope. (If the visit cannot be made to the church of the Confraternity, then any other church may be substituted. Religious living in community may make the visit in their church or ora-



1. The members are assured of the constant protection of Our Lady of Perpetual Help.

2. Through this devotion the members are endowed with an influence almost miraculous for the softening and converting of obstinate sinners.

3. The members share in the public devotions and other good works of the entire Archconfraternity.

3. Persons at a distance may be enrolled as members when they apply for admission.

"GO-GIVERS" VS. "GO-GETTERS"

"Go-getters" have been familiar to us for some time under this expressive if inelegant name, and now, as a logical consequence, "Gogivers" are also breaking into the good society

of everyday parlance.

Friends of the missions, whose hearts and purses are attuned to the missionary needs of the Church in co-operation with our heroic missionaries, certainly belong to the latter category. Our Lord had such in mind when He said: "It is more blessed to give than to receive."

"Go-givers" care not so much about what the world may give to them; their main concern is to make the world a better place to live in and to spend themselves in the effort.

THEY SHOW APOSTOLIC SPIRIT

"Archbishop Costantini, Apostolic Delegate to China, in an interview with the Holy Father declared that he could report, with pleasure, that missionaries in China are giving proof of a truly heroic, apostolic spirit, infinite courage

and patience.

"All of which is very true. The Catholic missionaries in China are indeed giving proof of a "truly heroic, apostolic spirit," a spirit, I venture to say, which vies with that of the great St. Paul in facing every conceivable trial physical, spiritual and mental. It is a spirit that urges them to sacrifice everything to plant the faith in the hearts of a people, too long subservient to superstition and now plunging headlong into the maelstrom of materialism and irreligion. As the Church sings of her first Apostles so she may sing today, 'These are the men who living in the flesh planted the Church into their blood.'

"And, come to think of it, these men are deserving of a little more consideration than they are getting. True, thousands of friends who know them, commiserate their trying posi-tion in China. Too bad there are still some so unapostolic of mind as to decry the movement to aid the foreign missions—even with prayer.' -"Franciscans in China."
