A few of the strong points are the catching and hitting of senior Bob Rarick. Bob's hitting the ball at about a .350 clip and specializes in camping under foul pop-ups. The pitching of freshman John Miller has been very impressive. John held the Coeur d'Alene Vikings to 1 earned run in 6 innings, and shut out both Post Falls and Lakeland for 6 innings, on their home fields. The recent hitting of outfielders Mike Boughton and John Jaeger add hope to the Academy "reconstruction" program.

He was more than a football coach to the Boys who played for him, and of course we were looking forward to having him again next year. # OUT OF THE PAST

Idaho, now in the process of celebrating its Centennial as a Territory, recalls with fond memories the establishment of Fort Sherman in 1877.

Originally called Fort Coeur d'Alene, the name was changed to Fort Sherman, in tribute to General William Tesumseh Sherman, who in 1877 recommended the establishment of the fort here.

General Sherman also started the march of the white man to the Coeur d'Alene vicinity by placing many of the Indians on reservations. This cleared up the threat of warlike attacks on the settlers.

At the turn of the century, after the fort was abandoned, many of the buildings were sold at auction. The land was set aside by the government to be used as a park and a cemetery in Coeur d'Alene.

In 1905, James W. Graham, representing the Catholic sisters of the Immaculate Heart of Mary, bought the military hospital and the opera house for the sisters. These buildings were to become the first and only Catholic High School in Coeur d'Alene.

Sister Clement, the Academy's first superior, took over the education of the school's first 64 pupils.

The grotto of the Immaculate Conception, which has been standing since 1925, has attracted the attention of all who have visited the convent grounds. It is sheltered by a red brick wall.

During the past year, the remains of Fort Sherman have been razed to make way for a new home for the sisters.
