## POPE PAUL VI MAKES HISTORIC PILGRIMAGE

The eyes of the world were turned on Jerusalem with anticipation last week during Pope Paul VI's visit to the Holy Land. His visit marked the first time a pope has made a trip to the Holy Land since the days of St. Peter. The Pontiff said he was going as a symbol of "the aspirations, the anxieties, the sufferings of the sick, the poor, the disinherited and the afflicted."

With this visit a new chapter will be written in the history of the Church. The Vicar of Christ on earth returned to the scene of his Master's agony, crucifixion, and resurrection. He visited the sacred shrines, prayed for world peace, and met with the head of the Eastern Orthodox Church, Patriarch Athenagoras in the quest for Christian unity.

During his visit he said Mass at the site of the Holy Sepulcher. He prayed at the tomb of Jesus, and visited the Garden of Gethsemane. He also made the "Stations of the Cross" commemorating the agony of Christ along the Via Dolorosa to the Crucifixion almost 2,000 years ago.

The Pontiff was given a hero's welcome upon returning to Rome, and his visit is considered to be both a spiritual and political success. There is also some speculation that the Pontiff may make a visit to the United States this year.

The annual retreat of IHM Academy, scheduled for January 22 to the 24 will include the seventh, eighth, and all high school students. Fathers Nutman and Zabelle, C.S.S.R. will be the retreat masters this year.

# UNITY OCTAVE TO BE OBSERVED

The Catholic Church observes the Chair of Unity Octave every year from January 18 to the 25. This widespread prayer, which is observed by many non-Catholics as well, calls for the Union of all Christians within the Catholic Church.

The Octave was begun by Father Francis Paul. Father Paul and the Franciscan Friars of Graymoor, founded as an Anglican community, came into the Catholic Church as a body in 1921.

The eight days are set aside as days of prayer with a certain intention for every day. The intentions are as follows: the return of the "other sheep," return of Oriental Separatists, submission of Anglicans, return of European Protestants, Catholic Unity for American Christians, conversion of the Jews, and missionary conquest of the world.

Until his death, Father Paul strived for and excelled in the Church Unity movement, and now the Friars of the Atonement continue his work.

# PRESIDENT ADDRESSES UNION

President Lyndon Johnson presented a budget far below expectations in his first State of the Union message to Congress on January 8, 1964.

Fiscal year, 1965, which begins on July 1, 1964, should cost the government only \$97.9 billion--\$500 million less than 1963 fiscal year.

Mr. Johnson next called for "unconditional war on poverty," and pledged joint federal-local efforts to cure and prevent poverty. He urged an early passage of his tax bill, which would release \$11 billion into the private spending stream, thereby creating new jobs and markets.

The President rejected labor's demand of a 35 hour work week, but endorsed a study of overtime working to see if a reduction would create more jobs. He challenged Russia to reduce its uranium output by 25% as the US is doing. He urged Congress to pass the Civil Rights Bill as soon as possible, and asked for an end to all discrimination.

Lastly, he asked Congress to join with him in working for peace and freedom for all time to come.

## KOOTENAI DEFEATS PANTHERS 61-55

The Kootenai Warriors came to IHM Friday, January 10, and defeated the Panthers in an exciting contest, 61-55.

IHM started slow and didn't score until the Warriors had registered 10 points. Kootenai took a big lead stretching it to 16 points by the middle of the second period. Then the Panthers caught fire. Sparked by the shooting of 6'3" sophomore John Miller, the Panthers rallied and cut down the lead to 7 by halftime, 33-26.

Coming out in the third quarter, the IHM Panthers pecked away at the Kootenai lead and tied it at 40-40 late in that quarter. The next eight minutes were fast and furious as both teams fought for the lead. Kootenai got five straight in the fourth and managed to hold that margin.

John Miller led all scores with 21 points.

## IHM ACADEMY WINS OVER LUMBERJACKS

After a bad first quarter, the Panthers settled down and defeated the Lumberjacks from St. Maries 56-43. Trailing 11-9 at the first quarter IHM scored 20 points in the second period behind the shooting of senior forward Don Anderson. Half-time score favored IHM 29-20.

Coaches Miller and Mitchell used both units in the second half with never a serious threat from the 'Jacks.

IHM's Don Anderson again led with 19 points.
