POST OFFICE HOLDS CEREMONY; DEVELOPMENT OF AREA NOTED

At the laying of the corner-stone for the new Post Office building in Coeur d'Alene, being constructed at Seventh and Lakeside, Congressman Compton White stressed the necessity of a new, modern building due to the steady growth and development of Coeur d'Alene and northern Idaho.

A number of dignitaries and many spectators were present when the corner-stone was put in place. The dignitaries included James Symbol, Seattle Post Office Department regional director.

Postmaster Eugene MacDonald prepared souvenirs of the ceremony which were placed in a copper box and attached to the corner-stone. In the box will be placed the names of those taking part in the ceremony, and a picture of the post office construction.

John Hartnett passed to Gary Miles for a touchdown in the second period but Mullan came back with a touchdown and a point for a tie at the half.

The Tigers led off the third quarter and retained the lead until the Panthers passed and converted for the winning score with only four minutes of play left.

IHM TEAM EDGES KOOTENAI 28-19

Gary Miles' reception and John Hartnett's interception, together with a run by Tom Neeser, combined to give the Panthers a 20-19 edge over Kootenai's Warriors. Tom Neeser and Gary O'Connell converted the extra points.

The game was played at the St. Maries field. Noteworthy of all touchdowns by both teams was the distance--all scoring plays covered at least 40 yards.

PANTHERS CRUSH PRIEST RIVER 28-0

The Panthers trounced the Priest River Spartans 28-0 in the Homecoming game on October 16, playing before an enthusiastic crowd at Person field.

The first score came in the opening period when John Hartnett hit John Miller on a fake in the end zone. Jerry Neeser intercepted a pass to set up a scoring play, with Tom Neeser passing to Gary Miles in the end zone for the score. Neeser converted and the Panthers led 15-0 at half-time.

Jerry Neeser received in the end zone for the first score, followed by Gary O'Connell to lead 13-0 at the half.

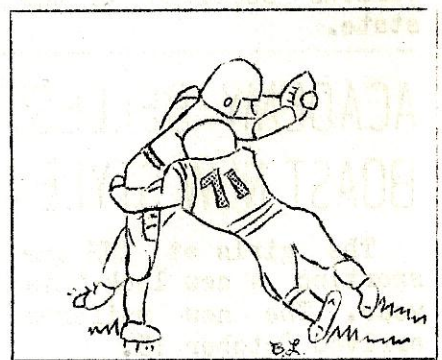
In the final quarter, Mike Cronquist received for the last score to wind up the game.

This affair staged by the sophomore class for the seniors was a fitting tribute to the hard-fighting Academy Panthers and their plucky coach, Gene Boyle.

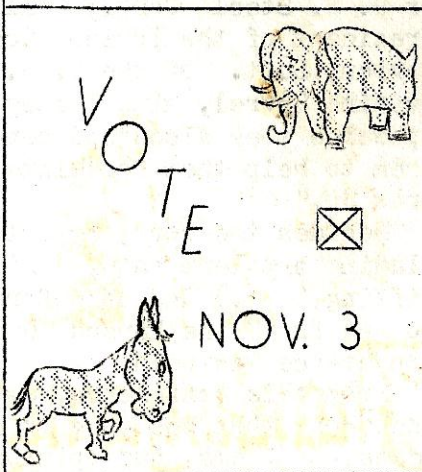
