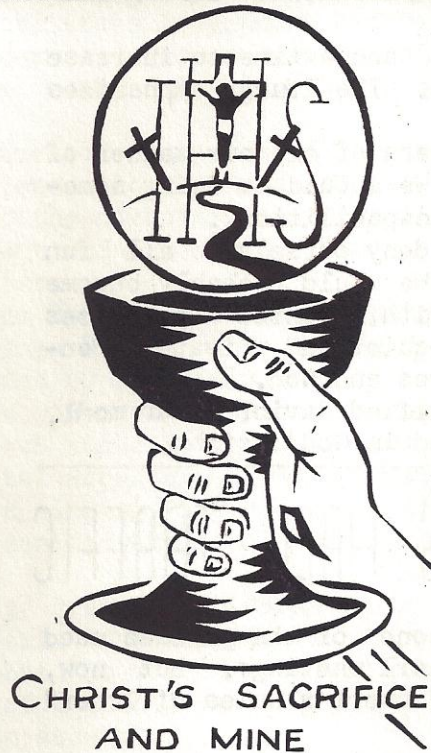

Jay spoke on the governmental purposes of Boy's State and told of his experiences in the House of Representatives. Gary related the structure and organization of the state government and the social life and entertainment of the delegates.

They emphasized that the purpose of their trip was to learn the structure of our state government. Janice explained the governmental aspects of Girls' State, and was joined by Linda in singing the "Federalist" party song. Linda then described the social fun and excitement which prevailed.

Tom Neeser, Student Body President, spoke on the Student Council and its efforts to maintain discipline in the school. He stated that the students should pay more attention to the code of conduct.

Dropout Film Presented To IHM Students

Hit those books! A word to the wise, was the obvious conclusion that followed a speech and movie recently presented to Academy students by Mr. Max Burke of the Employment Agency of Coeur d'Alene.

Mr. Burke spoke on the necessity for students to complete a high school education. Stressing the importance of education today, he told how a high school diploma is a must, required by most firms from those seeking job opportunities. Also he told how today's modern world of technology is requiring more and more students to further their education in college.

Following Mr. Burke's orientation on the dropouts' problems, he showed a motion picture which emphasized the main points of his talk. It featured a high school dropout who soon found it almost impossible to get any reputable job since he lacked a high school diploma.

LITURGY CHANGES EFFECTIVE; RITES LESS COMPLICATED

New ceremonies designed to simplify the Mass became effective in the Boise Diocese on Sunday, March 7.

The ceremonies of the Mass are now less complicated with the elimination or modification of ceremonial kisses, bows, genuflections and ritual gestures.

Two of the most noticeable changes are the omission of Psalm 42 from the Prayers at the Foot of the Alter and the Last Gospel. These prayers were omitted because they are primarily private prayers of the priest.

During the Creed there is no genuflection at the words "And He became flesh," only a bow. The genuflection is retained only on the feast of Christmas and the Annunciation.

The bell is no longer rung at the "Holy, Holy, Holy." The bell is still rung shortly before the Consecration to warn the congregation. It is rung only once at each elevation, not at the priest's genuflection before and after the elevations.

At the communion the server gives a signal to the communicants with the small bell. He does not ring the bell at the "Domine non sum Dignus" of the celebrant.

The remaining modifications are minor ones affecting only the priest.

Seniors Hear Vocation Talks

With graduation nearing, the seniors have been visited by several speakers who have spoken on professions in the modern world.

Rev. E. Sullivan from Carroll College told about his college and its course of study.

The National Guard was represented by M. F. Green who pointed out the opportunities in the services, especially in the National Guard.

Mr. Herb Munroe from Kinman Business College spoke to the juniors and seniors. He showed slides of the new types of machines used in the business world.
