JOHN HARTNETT ELECTED STUDENT BODY PRESIDENT

After a week of vigorous campaigning, the following candidates for the Student Council offices emerged victorious: John Hartnett, President; Mike Elgee, Vice President, Ann Kryger, Secretary, and Gleta Long, Treasurer.

These students were elected in the Student Body elections of May 14.

They will take office in September.

During the campaign, many slogans, signs, and catchy sayings were posted throughout the school.

Campaign speeches were delivered over the public address system by candidates for president, John Hartnett and Michael Peters, and vice-presidential candidates Michael Elgee and John Miller.

At a rally conducted by Thomas Neeser, Student Body President, students heard the platforms of the eight major contestants.

SALES TAX IS EFFECTIVE JULY 1

Students--beware! Beginning July 1, 1965, you will have a state sales tax assessed against you whenever you buy more than two candybars at the candy counter. The trick to avoiding the tax is to restrict your buying to less than 14¢.

The sales tax, passed March 11 in the Idaho State Legislature, imposes a tax of one cent on purchases of 14¢ to 34¢, two cents tax on 35¢ to 73¢ and three cents tax from 74¢ to \$1.13. This measure is expected to raise \$56 million to cover decreases in the state's property and income taxes, and an increase in allotments to state governmental agencies, especially the public school systems.

The tax is not applicable to gasoline or professional services, but covers almost all other retail sales.

Sen. Bill Webster, and Reps. Art Manley, John Molyneaux, and C. W. Neider, all D-Kootenai, opposed the bill. Sen. Perry Swisher, R-Bannock (Pocatello area), sponsored the bill both times it came before the legislature. The measure was defeated 26-18 in the senate

the first time, but a few days later passed, 24-20.

Opposition forces in the legislature put forth several plans to raise the needed money without a sales tax. Sen. Webster proposed taxing non-profit organizations. The Idaho Farm Bureau proposed doubling the state income taxes.

A public petition for a referendum in the 1966 voting has been presented to the state. The issue will now be placed on the ballot, and the public will vote on the matter. However, the measure will have been in effect for 16 months by voting time.

COEUR D'ALENE AT ROUND-UP

Kaylen Kuka, a sophomore, will be the representative from Coeur d'Alene for the 1965 International Senior Girl Scout Round-Up. She is one of the 32 Inland Empire girls chosen from 500 applicants.

The Round-Up will take place July 17-26 at the old Farragut Naval base on Lake Pend Oreille. The purpose of the Round-Up is to increase public understanding of Girl Scouting through a large-scale demonstration of the Girl Scout program in action. Also the Round-Up will give those attending experience in living and working with girls from different backgrounds to give these girls a sense of belonging to a strong and unified movement, and to give girls the opportunity to demonstrate resourcefulness, technical skills, and personal adaptability.

There will be six main areas on the site. Five of these areas will be for the campers. Each main area will be divided into troops and patrols. There will be eight girls in a patrol, four patrols in a troop, and eight troops to a unit, or main area.

The sixth area will be the rendezvous area, or the central area, where all campers will gather for forums and activities. It will include the Avenue of Flags where flags from the United States and forty different countries will be represented, a number of exhibit tents, and a Forum Center where the nine major forums will take place.
