Boys' Staters Chosen; Foredyce, Huetter Named

Joseph Foredyce and M. J. Huetter were selected to attend Boys' State for 1969 to be held in Boise the first week in June. The selection was announced after a careful deliberation period by the faculty regarding the boys' general attitudes, initiative and qualities of leadership.

Two alternates, Robert Riggs and Walter Matson, were chosen to represent IHM in the event that the initial delegates would not be able to attend. All four boys are juniors and have displayed outstanding characteristics in the classroom and on the athletic field during their first three years of high school.

Foredyce has been active in Student Council, Math and Science Club, National Honor Society, Glee Club, Press Club, Lettermen's Club, Explorer Scouts, football, basketball, and track. He is acting president of the junior class.

Huetter has membership in Press Club, Sports Editor for the Laurel, Math and Science Club, National Honor Society, Lettermen's Club, and Explorer Scouts. To round out his curriculum he participates in football, basketball and track.

Boys' State will begin June 1 and will continue for one full week. Idaho American Legion will direct the program at the Boise State College campus in Boise. The boys are being sponsored by local civic and church groups.

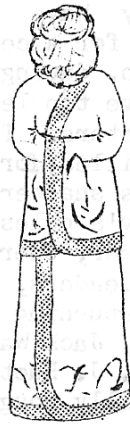
Displaying superb vocal talent and surprising acting ability, the cast enthralled hundreds of excited play-goers from near and far, old and young, during the busy weekend's five performances.

The IHM track team, with an easy win in the last event, inched Lakeland for a 69-68 victory at Post Falls April 3.

IHM's mile relay team consisting of Ron Douglas, Jack Wardian, Bob Riggs and M. J. Huetter took 5 points which pushed the Panthers 1 point past Lakeland. Lakeland took an early 30-15 point lead in the field events. This was IHM's first win over Lakeland in its 4-year history as a track team and IHM now stands 1-0 in the Intermountain League.

IHM downed Priest River and Bonners Ferry in a triangular dual meet Saturday, April 12. The scores were IHM 74, Priest River 62, and IHM 89, Bonners Ferry 48.
