## IHM PANTHERS ARE ON TO STATE

For the third time in the last four years, IHM Coach Gene Boyle's Panthers have earned a trip to the A-3 State Basketball Tournament.

They became the District I delegates March 2 by shattering the Mullan Tigers 71-64 at Kellogg.

The Panthers showed coolness under pressure by molding a 12-point lead midway through the second quarter. The Tigers were unsuccessful in shrinking the deficit, as the half ended 32-23.

Mullan gained little headway in the third period, but in the fourth quarter, the Tigers staged a threatening rally. The Panthers' lead was diminished to one point with 3:14 left in the game.

The Panthers, in the face of this rally, exhibited finesse characteristic of their past season. A freethrow by Pat King and a Dave Stockwell field goal started the Panthers on the road to victory. Mullan retaliated with a bucket, but cage star John Boller countered with a driving lay-in that set the score at 66-62. Two clutch tosses from the charity stripe by King destroyed Mullan's hopes of victory.

The Tigers stuffed one more basket, and three IHM freethrows by Boller capped the scoring.

Boller ran away with the scoring honors by net-

ting 31 points. The IHM team captain stuffed 11 out of 13 field goals and nine out of 12 freethrows. Tiger team captain Spike Elwood was next with 17, and IHM's King canned 16.

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The IHM Panthers opened the Tournament with a lopsided victory over the Potlatch Loggers Feb. 25.

At the end of the first quarter, the Panther quint led 17-6. After that, IHM continued its domination to an 82-47 score at the final buzzer.

Three Panthers hit the double figure column: Art Webb, 22, John Boller and Brad Novak, each with 14 points. For the Loggers, Phil Knott was high gunner at 19.

the Panthers, and the  
half with IHM ahead 15-9.

The Laurel recently conducted a poll to determine  
the reactions of IHM students to "Buvel's Revel," a

The results show a resounding approval of the show,  
as 94% of those participating said they enjoyed it.

## Victory Ends IHM Season

IHM emerged top-seeded in the A-3 District Tournament as they downed the Mullan Tigers 78-64 at Mullan Feb. 21.

The Panthers showed the spirit that has carried them through a 15-5 season. IHM slowly lost a 15-point lead and with 59 seconds left in the 3rd quarter were behind 46-41. But the Panthers rallied in the fourth period, and outscored the Tigers 37-18.

The Panthers' first five all broke into double figures: Boller and Novak with 19, Webb-15, King-14, and Stockwell-11.

Mullan had three players in double figures: Elwood-18, Smith-12, and Graham-10.

The Tigers were victorious over the IHM Jr. Varsity in the season finale, 52-46.

Goggin earned scoring honors with 15 points in his team's triumph. Lonnie Brown canned 11 for IHM.

The Panther JV's finished the year with a 7-12 win-loss record.

## Trojans Humble IHM 98-79

The Post Falls Trojans, Intermountain League champs, dealt IHM a crushing defeat 98-79 at Post Falls Feb. 20.

In one of the highest scoring games in North Idaho, four of the Trojan starting five netted 20 points or more; Bowen-22, Coles-21, Miller and Adams with 20 each.

The Panthers spread their scoring among the first five: Boller and Novak-16, Stockwell and Webb-14, and King-12.

## Priest River Edges Panthers

Priest River nipped the Panther Jr. Varsity 42-37 on Feb. 7 at Priest River.

The Panthers, trailing by one point at half-time, found themselves "colder" than the Spartans in the third quarter, and were outscored 13-7. Naccarato took high game honors for Priest River with 17 points, and Roch Koep scored nine for JHM.

## Panther JV's Bomb Potlatch

The IHM JV's trounced Potlatch 64-39 Feb. 6 in the Brown Gymnasium.

IHM's Roch Koep came out high gunner for the night with 22 points, followed closely by Nicholson of Potlatch with 21.

The Panthers cashed in 22 points in the final period of the game, while holding their opponents to seven.

## IHM Snags Second Place

IHM clinched second place in the Intermountain League with an 86-64 triumph over the Wallace Miner Feb. 13.

In the game played at Wallace, the Panthers hit 48% from the field and 64% from the charity line. Veteran John Boller bombed in 32 points for the victorious Panthers.

In a closely contested preliminary battle, the IHM JV's fell to Wallace, 68-63.

Rife and Bowlby led the Wallace victory with 32 and 12 points, resp. IHM found a balanced scoring attack in Lonnie Brown, 18, Charlie Picken, 16, and Roch Koep, 11.

## Panthers Pound Priest River

The Panthers of IHM downed the Priest River Spartans 56-43 at the L. V. Brown Gym Feb. 14.

Panther Art Webb netted 23 points to take the scoring honors. Panther John Boller scored 14, followed by Spartan Elgin with 13.

The Panther kittens avenged an earlier loss to the Priest River Jr. Varsity by inching past them 43-40.

## Confusion's Corner

Our happiness or well-being depends directly on the goodness or badness of the soul. It is not happiness to possess health, or strength, or wealth, unless we know how to use these advantages rightly. If we use them wrongly, they will only be so many means to misery. The reason why hardly any one achieves happiness is not that men do not wish to be happy--no one ever wishes anything but true good, that is, true happiness--but men miss their happiness in spite of the universal wish for it because they do not know what it is. They mistake for the real good some things which are not really good, like unlimited wealth or power.

The first and fundamental requisite for happiness, then, is that men should know the true good and not confuse it with anything else. The good state of the soul is precisely that state in which it never makes the mistake of taking anything to be good when it is not really good. To "make one's soul as good as possible" thus means to attain the knowledge of good which will prevent us from using strength, health, wealth, opportunity, wrongly. If a man has this knowledge he will always act on it, since to do otherwise would be to prefer known misery to known happiness, and this is contrary to human nature.

All virtues are knowledges of the good and all vices are ignorance of the true good. Popular goodness--what passes current as virtue--is mostly a matter of habit, not of assured conviction about good. It breaks down under temptation; but if a man really thinks that to commit a crime is worse than to suffer loss or pain, no fear of these things would lead him to commit a crime.

Knowledge of good is the one knowledge of which it is impossible to make an ill use; the possession of it is a guarantee that it will always be used as a right.
