More Tests

Juniors Will

Take NMSQT

The National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test will be administered to approximately thirty IHM juniors on Feb. 17, 1970.

This three-hour test is designed to identify talented eleventh-grade students on the basis of their development in English, mathematics, social studies, natural sciences, and word usage. The results are particularly appropriate for comparison with college-bound students' performances.

"We will use the test," said Sister M. Ida, principal, "to help students, parents, and teachers identify individual weaknesses and strengths in each student's educational development and in making a realistic appraisal of his educational and vocational goals."

Results of the tests taken last year showed that Maureen McCammon merited a Letter of Commendation for her distinguished performance on the tests. This means that, of all students in Idaho who took the exams she was in the top ten percent.

Veteran IHM mentor Eugene Boyle, along with Bill Miles of Moscow, was honored as Coach of the Year, and his 1969 undefeated football team was selected Team of the Year.

"I think this team, especially the 18 seniors, deserved the award more than any other team I've had," stated Coach Royle while accepting the trophy before capacity crowd of over 600 people.

Along with these awards, Jerry Hendren, leading pass receiver of the nation from the University of Idaho, was unanimously voted Amateur Athlete of the Year, and Dwight Church, Legion Baseball Coach from Lewiston, was picked Coach of the Decade.

Six Accepted To State Chorus

On Nov. 15, 1969, six students of IHM traveled to Moscow, Idaho, to be judged for acceptance into the Idaho State Choral Association. Word was recently received by Sister M. Alphonsa that they all made it!

The singers are: seniors--Kris Kryger, Jane McFarland, Bob Riggs; juniors--Sandra Georgius, Cheryl Schmidt, and Kevin Roche.

In the judging, each contestant had to sing either "America, the Beautiful" or "America", and arpeggios of their individual range, both without piano accompaniment. In addition, they were required to read and sing their line of a four-part song which they had never seen before.

From March 19-21, the vocalists will attend a gathering of all members of the State Chorus, which will present a public concert at the end of the convention. The music which will be used is now on its way to Sister Alphonsa, who will begin tutoring the six next week.

TIME OUT

In 1964, a young teacher-coach named Gene Boyle arrived at IHM High School planning to coach football, basketball, and baseball when he wasn't teaching math and general science.

The first thing he did was engender a spirit into the hearts of the students, a spirit which would later become synonymous with IHM. The second thing he did was begin coaching . . . the results of this would be felt for the next six years.

In his first year, Boyle guided IHM to a 5-2-1 record in football, considered at that time to be one of its finest. For the next three years, his teams would go undefeated, and two would be selected "Team of the Year" in North Idaho.

Granted, some men excel in coaching one particular sport, but Coach Boyle . . .

In 1967, parochial schools were admitted to the Idaho High School Interscholastics Activities for the first time in the state's history. That same year, a "Cinderella" team from "Immaculate Heart of Mary High in Coeur d'Alene" captured the state championship. This team was also named "Team of the Year." And the following year saw an unprecedented repeat performance of the state title victory.

Boyle set up a track program three years ago, and since then has had three District victories, a first and a second at Regional, and co-runner-up at State Track Meet.

His practices are grueling and agonizing. His game plan changes for each encounter, setting up the trials of learning new defenses and offenses every week. Now the spirit he set up six years ago plays its role, for with all these hardships, 72 out of a total of 112 boys at IHM turned out for football last season.

This is a glowing example of the kind of coach Gene Boyle is, and I feel I can't express it better than one girl, who, after the recent Sports Banquet, declared, "He's deserved the 'Coach of the Year' award for the past five years!"
