The boys will depart for Boise the first week of June. While at the capital, the delegates will have the opportunity of running their own representative form of government for one week.



## MAC ARTHER LOSES BATTLE; DEATH IS CONQUEROR

"Hoist the colors to their peak and let no enemy pull it down!" These words of General Douglas MacArthur best express his fighting spirit and determination to win. All through his life he exemplified this spirit and determination. He graduated from West Point at the age of nineteen at the head of his class. In World WarI he was wounded twice and decorated thirteen times. World War II he was made commander-in-chief of the Armed Forces in the Far East. Stationed on the Philipire Islands he held off the Japanese, with a small force which many authorities considered almost miraculous until rallied by President Roosevelt. On leaving he made his famous promise "I will return." Less than three years later he returned to drive the Japanese from the Filipino shores. Several months later, September 2, 1945, General MacArthur met aboard the U.S.S. Missouri in Tokyo harbor with Japanese delegates to sign the terms of Japan's surrender.

In his last battle, even the will and determination of MacArthur could not win. Death the conquerer of all men was the victor. We have seen the passing of a great man who lived, fought, and was ready to give his life for his country.


