ALIENS MUST REPORT ADDRESSES

All aliens in the United States, except a few diplomats, accredited members of certain international organizations and those admitted temporarily as agricultural laborers, must report their addresses to the government each January.

Forms for this purpose are available at any post office or office of the United States Immigration and Naturalization Service. They may be filled out in those offices and returned to the clerk from whom received. Parents or guardians are required to submit reports for alien children under fourteen years of age.

If you or any members of your family are not citizens of the United States you should tell your parents of these requirements. If you have relatives or friends who are not citizens, you will do both them and the government a great service by telling them of the requirements. Remember, the time for reporting is during the month of January.

The JV game left IHM 85 and Plummer 28. Larry Riplinger had 12 points and Steve Popiel had 10.

The Panthers came a-cross with their fourth straight victory in a 65-57 decision over Kootenai's Warriors at Harrison. Dennis Treichel and John Hartnett led Panther scoring with 16 and 15 points respectively, and their work offset a 29-point performance by Dick Chatfield of the Warriors.

The JV game also went in the Academy's favor 53-34.

The Panthers started off the season with what proved to be a pace setter—a 60-46 win over Clark Fork's Wampus Cats. John Miller, Gary Miles, and Gary O'Connell were high scorers, with 18, 17, and 15 points.

The Junior Varsity game was also a victory for the Panthers. Skip Sand and Jim Russell led scoring with 18 and 16 points toward the final 66-49 score.

John Miller with 23 points led the Panthers to a 58-45 win against Priest River on the home court. Dennis Treichel and Jim Russell scored 7 points each.


