

Parochial Schools Dealt Blow

Idaho's parochial schools narrowly lost on a measure to admit them to full membership in the Idaho High School Interscholastic Activities Association.

The measure received one vote less than the necessary 2/3 majority as 36 delegates to the representative assembly voted against it on Jan. 21.

Bishop Treinen has expressed disappointment at the delegation assembly's defeat of the motion. "No one should be afraid of this kind of competition," he said, referring to the participation of parochial school students in basketball and track tournaments.

He stated that parents and children should not be penalized for their choice of educational facilities.

The action of the Association delays approval of the measure at least a year. It will take effect the year after passage.
