Jim's trip to the nation's capital was 1st place prize in the VFW's Voice of Democracy Contest.

Leaving on the afternoon of Mar. 4 in a Boeing 727. Jim arrived in Washington the next morning.

Shaking hands with Vice-President Humphrey, Secretary of State Dean Rusk and Senator Robert Kennedy (D., N.Y.), was all part of the trip.

Jim, sight-seeing in a chartered bus with 53 other winners, proceeded to the Lincoln and Jefferson Memorials, Mt. Vernon, the National Archives, the Smithsonian Institute, the Voice of America studios, and the National Shrine of the Immaculate Conception.

During his be days in Washington, Jim visited the Senate and the House of Representatives while they were in session. He shook hands with his representative, Compton I. White (D., Ida.), and caught a glimpse of Senate Majority Leader, Everett Dirksen.

The group watched the changing of the guard at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier in Arlington National Cemetery and placed a wreath on the grave of President John F. Kennedy.

A side trip to Williamsburg was of special interest. There the Virginia House of Burgesses is restored to its 17th century beauty.

On his last night in Washington, Jim attended a Congressional banquet where the awards were announced before an audience of 1500 to 2000 people.

IHM Senior Wins Legion Contest



The game opened slow when the Panther press took hold and the northerners romped to a 16-8 first quarter lead behind the shooting of John Hartnett and John Miller.

In the second frame the Knights got hot and walked all over their Panther counterparts 21-7 to take a 29-

23 lead into the dressing room.

The third period saw the Panthers regroup themselves and come back strong to leave the Knights with a shaky

two point lead of 39-37.

In the fourth quarter the hustling Panthers pressed hard to sneak to a three point lead with two minutes remaining. Here the stalling Panthers hit on four of five free throws and rode out the victory.

The Panthers finished the year with an 18-4 record and brought home two trophies. After the game Coach Boyle was quoted as saying, "It was the finest display of teamwork he has seen in high school basketball."

Further Changes Made By Council

"I will go to the altar of God-to God who is the joy of my youth." This quote from Psalm 42 describes the way Catholics will all begin Mass after March 27.

The continuing changes in the Mass, initiated by the Vatican Council, will on that date bring about almost complete transformation in the vernacular of the vocal parts of the Mass.

There will be no liturgical modifications, however.

Changes in the fast and abstinence laws were put into effect at the beginning of Lent.

Catholics under 14 are no longer required to abstain from meat on Friday, and adults over 21 and under 59 must fast only on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday.

As these changes were announced by the Vatican, it was emphasized that Catholics are still urged to perform penances under their own volition.
