The Sisters who teach in your school are dedicated to the active life rather than the contemplative. They have gradually made changes to fit the present day needs of driving cars, traveling farther and more often to conventions and workshops, speaking in public, working more closely with the laity. Before long, you will see your Sisters taking part in activities that will be certainly far different from the work of the Sister of even ten years ago.

So tomorrow your Sisters will look different, but they will be the same: dedicated to be of service to

you in the modern world.


IHM Increases Enrollment For 1966-67 School Year

IHM High School opened its 166-167 school gyear with a total of 198 students, an increase of 9 over last year.

The freshmen boast the largest class, 55, with 128 boys and 27 girls. Sophomores rank second with 52 students. The sophomores are the only class in which the girls outnumber the boys.

The junior class has a total of 46, 24 boys and 22 girls.

This year the seniors have the smallest class. There are 45 students, 25 boys and 20 girls, with the largest ratio of boys to girls in the school.

SPLINTERS FROM THE BENCH

An undefeated season can leave a lot for upcoming teams to live up to, and that holds true for the present situation. So far this season the Panthers have been able to pretty well carry on the pattern set by last year's spectacular team. Four games played can't determine the course of the entire season, but up to this point we haven't yet suffered a loss. The opening tie with Potlatch was discouraging and the scores of this year's games aren't as striking as those of last year, but nevertheless the shadow of defeat hasn't darkened the IHM score.

One factor should be recognized: along with inspiration, an undefeated season can leave a legacy of toughened opponents. Remember that Panthers haven't been beaten on the football field in seventeen games, since mid-164. That means that we have the reputation of being one of the toughest teams around, which is actually a fine feather in the cap. But consider that in a different light and add to it the fact that we absolutely humiliated many ball clubs last year, and you'll see that for the 1966 IHM football team every game played is a special one for the opposition. For every opponent the IHM game is the big one: they're sure to be fired up and out for blood, and that frame of mind makes a team 100% stronger. But we have a counter-asset on our side, the fact that for the IHM High School every game is a big one--Panthers don't believe in slacking off for anyone; every contest is, as it should be, an important one. As long as we keep this in mind along with the other rules of a successful team, this year's Panthers will be capable of beating any team around.

Panthers Tie Potlatch, 6-6
