It was a once in a lifetime experience for not only the scouts, but also for the tens of thousands of visitors who took this opportunity to meet with boys of all nationalities and


cultures.

The school mascot, the black panther, rode on the front of the car, which carried signs in recognition of the state basketball championship that was won last


Anne Erickson and Ruth Harrington, two JV cheer-

The Panthers struck early in the passing of Tom McFarland as the veteran Pilot tossed scoring aerials to Mike and Pat Gray. With the conversion of a single extra point, the Panthers left the field at halftime with a 13-0 lead.

The third quarter saw a fiery band of Panthers score three additional touchdowns as the Grays sprinted through numerous holes opened by the potent Panther line.

Priest River got on the scoreboard in the final period on an end sweep by their left halfback to raise the score to 34 to 7. On the following kick-off however, Pat Gray snagged the ball, picked up some crushing blocks, and scampered 80 yards to cap off the Panther scoring and hand the Spartans a 41-7 defeat.

In fact, in four grid seasons, Coach Boyle's troopers have suffered but two defeats at the hands of their opponents.

Currently, the Panther picture has taken on a new dimension. The beginnings of a JV team that sprouted last year have blossomed into a thriving squad of freshman and sophomores. Unlike last year, Coach Boyle has run the youngsters through their drills entirely separated from the varsity, thus producing a more coherent and smooth-operating squad. As a result, their two encounters with foreign turf-grinders have resulted in a pair of close victories.

The varsity, which now consists of some 25 odd men, has been terrorizing their oppontents this year amassing lift points in three games and giving up only seven to their foes. From my somewhat unwanted vantage point on the Panther bench I have keenly observed some strong line play and flashy backfield running. The off-the-field scene of the practice turf, however, has been the ingot from which pours the Panthers' weekend thrusts. Basing his resolutions on this conviction, Coach Boyle has strong hopes of continuing the "Panther trend."

## IHM Torpedoes Bonners Ferry

IHM rambled through its 25th straight game undefeated by smashing Bonners Ferry 39-0. The Panthers ran this seasons mark to 3-0 and remain in a tie for first place in the Intermountain League with Lakeland at 2-0.

Boyle's bombers started fast with 20 points in the first period on a 60 yard punt return by Pat Gray and two 15 yard rushes by Mike Gray. Chris Jacobson's extra point kicks were good on two of three tries. The second quarter slowed slightly to 12 points with Bob Elgee taking a bomb from the wing of Tom McFarland for one TD and Mike Gray on a short rush for the other. The third quarter saw the Panther reserves scoring the sixth and final TD of the evening as Don Shannon bulled in from the one.

The Panther defense was superb as it held off all Badger threats and come up with two interceptions.

## IHM Burns Potlatch 340

The 1967 edition of the IHM High School Panthers football team made its debut against the Potlatch Loggers and it did it up proud as it avenged a 6-6 tie of the last season by shelling the Loggers 34-0. The passing of Tom McFarland and the running of Pat Gray led Gene Boyle's charges through this 23rd straight game without defeat.

Pat Gray, the Panther's 135 pound scatback, gained 350 yards and scored four touchdowns while Paul Gebhart scored the remaining touchdown on a pass from signal caller Tom McFarland.

"They looked good in some spots and bad in others" was Coach Boyle's remark after the game.
