Youth Speaks Out

From the progress of past civilizations evolved our modern society, just as we will very directly and very vitally affect future generations. Whether we choose to infect the future with the filth and agony of our age, or to enrich it with an abundance that could be, is decided by the standards that we create in our own society.

Our society is beginning to put more and more emphasis on the individual. This emphasis is becoming so acute that the individuality, in many cases, is pushed to nonconformity. We hear of this twist to nonconformity in the form of the hippie, the draft dodger, the dope addict. Each of these "individualists" is a resis-

tor of the rigid rule of society.

Another characteristic of our own society is the striving for peace and unification. Youth today is, in general, more responsive, more intensely active, more present in the world today than it has been in past generations. This side of youth is all too often hidden from the sensationalism of the press. It is unjustly forced into the background as the violence of our age is emphasized and the role of the minority is magnified. But the union of classes and peoples can be realized if the alert youth can discover ways to bring the concept of community and service and love into whatever society he finds himself.

If our future depends upon the played-up social trends of sex, drugs, and the hippie movement, I see a society filled with empty, meaningless people. If the future leaders of our country are the same youths who roam the nation in search of an escape, I see an unrealistic, restless society. But if those who have chosen to withstand these trends to take up personal responsibility, and maintain openness and generosity and a sense of freedom are able to shape our society, future generations will benefit, rather than suffer, from our standards.

Recently named finalist in Coach-of-the-Year competition of the Inland Empire Sports Banquet has been Coach Gene Boyle.
