Panthers Recapture State A-3 Crown

For the second time in two consecutive attempts the IHM Panthers have captured the Idaho A-3 basketball crown. The tournament, which took place in Burley March 7, 8, and 9, was capped by IHM's close victory over Potlatch by the score of 72-67.

Potlatch, a team the Panthers beat twice in regular season play came on strong in the first quarter and was down by only five points at the half. The narrow margin,

37-32, was soon lenghtened to 59-49 after a spirited third quarter. Despite the threat posed by Potlatch's sudden outburst of scoring in the closing minutes, IHM managed to retain an adequate lead till the final buzzer.

The Panthers rallied behind Pat Gray's output of 21 points and Paul Fromm's effort of 19. Mike Gray was not to be counted out however, as he pumped in 14 points and gave the fans a look at some superb ball handling. Steve Kammeyer of Potlatch, hitting for 31 points, proposed a constant danger to the Panthers, but the IHM big men, Paul Fromm and Jim Giesa, made corrective measures by snatching a majority of the rebounds. Near the end of the game a control offense consisting almost entirely of the Grays' dribbling wizardry paid off with the 72-67 victory. (Cont. page 5.)

Upon receiving the only special individual award given to Panther basketball players, Chris quickly retorted that it belonged not just to him but to the whole team. Coach Boyle had only the highest praise for the 5'll forward.

Coach Bill Racicot, head basketball from Carroll College, was the guest speaker at the affair. His address emphasized that, "It takes real men to be athletes and real men to be Christiams." Jack Hartnett, emcee, paid tribute to Coach Boyle's fantastic coaching job over the past four years and added a wish that the "builder of men" would continue successfully.


SOPHOMORE GIRLS WIN INTRAMURALS


