It was quiet in the classroom. Nobody knew quite what to say or do; mbody knew what had really happened in the several hours before. And then somebody started singing downstairs...like a chorus or something...they were singing something like, "We love you Panthers." and it sounded like the walls were going to come down. Then one person in the room who knew it had to be done stood up and said, "If we have a school like that, we should go down to them." And the whole team got up and went down to where everybody was singing like it was all planned or something. And nobody wanted to do anything but cry and feel sorry.

Some wanted to get drunk; some wanted to go outside and sit down; some just wanted to feel sad. And then like it had been hanging in the gym for three years something big and unknowingly heavy fell down and hit everybody. The IHM Panthers finally had a successful football team.

Sure three touchdowns said they didn't but 217 pairs of wet eyes said they did. Everybody was kissing and hugging each other and the gym kind of shed a big tear over the whole scene. It was the most real thing that IHM had ever experienced. Nobody on that team had ever seen a final score that wasn't in the Panther's favor since they had been Panthers themselves. And although they knew there were 21 points telling them the cpposite, they were sure they had won something. And they knew they were going to win it again on Monday and Tuesday and Wednesday and every other day in their lives, no matter what the scoreboard said.

What really happened that night? Nobody can say for certain. Was it the upset of the year? Did the Panther football dynasty finally topple? No. It was much more simple yet much more important than all that. Nobody wanted to set fire to Lakeland High School or instigate a mass riot. They just wanted to keep on winning the way Mr. Boyle had taught them to win. They just wanted to keep on feeling the way Saturday night made them feel. They just wanted to show the world what had been shown to them. They just wanted to be Panthers and totall everybody that they were from IHM.

Panthers Nip Loggers In 4th

In a close 25-20 contest IHM defeated Potlatch, August 31, to boost their winning streak to 32 games without a loss.

At half time the score read 12-6 in favor of the Panthers. But after the third quarter started the Loggers carried the ball for a second touchdown. IHM, then down by 1 point, soon took the small side of a 20-12 score as the determined Loggers cashed in for seven more points. Late in the fourth quarter the Panthers regained their momentum and scored on a long run by fullback Don Shannon. After covering an outside kick they began once again to move the ball. Shannon finally capped the drive by a short run over guard and gave the Panthers the final edge.

THM ran up some 300plus yards in the game and gave future opponents something to worry about.

Koctenai Falls To IHM Squad

IHM tripped up the Kootenai Warriors in a first half battle to take a 26-6 victory in the non-conference battle at Kootenai, Sept. 13.

The Panthers hit paydirt about midway through the first quarter when full back Don Shannon burst over the goal line on a three yard run. In the second quarter Jeff Norton intercepted a pass

Two plays later Norton carried the ball into the endzone on a two yard keeper to make the score 13-0. pushed in to score for the third time in the first when Bob Riggs plunged in from three yards out. Jack Wardian then kicked his second extra point to give the Panthers a 20-0 lead at half.

In the second half the Panthers lost their momentum and Kootenai picked it up momentarily. Steve Chatfield released a 40 yard touchdown pass to Steve Rasor who accounted for Kootenai's only score. Shortly after the kickoff Shannon took the ball around end for a 52 yard gain before being hauled down from behind Kootenai linebacker. off-tackle run by Norton then gave the final score.

Panthers Come Back Strong

The Panther football team, after losing to Lakeland a week before, came back the night of the 28th to

wallop Priest River 30-13.

IHM quickly established a running game in the first quarter but fumbled soon after they crossed midfield. A tough Panther defense forced the Spartans to punt on their first series of downs. The blue squad began to roll once more and on second down Jerry Mason rambled

44 yards to paydirt.

The next score came on a 1 yard dive by quarterback Jeff Norton early in the second quarter. A few minutes later the Panthers penetrated deep into Spartan territory and Norton again sprinted into the endzone. The final touchdown of the first half was set up by a 25 yard pass from John McFarland to Mason, taking the ball to the Spartan 1 yard line. Don Shannon leaped over defenders to pick up the yard, making the score 24-0 at half.

Six minutes through the third quarter "Golden Boy" Shannon waddled 51 yards for six more points on a fake punt. From that point on the Panther second squad took over. Moments later with a key block from the referee the Spartans scored on an 80 yard passplay from Dennis Veltri to Dale King. Veltri then ran the extra point.

The fourth quarter was dominated by the young Panthers on both offense and defense and the 30-7 advantage seemed as if it would hold. But with two minutes left on the clock and a time out on the field Ventrisprinted nine yards for the last touchdown of the game.

IHM managed to pile up 426 net yards to Priest


River's 165. When asked for his impression of the game, head manager Bob Blessing said, "We socked their eyebrows off!"

Hawk fullback Rick Hindberg was the first man to hit paydirt as he went 29 yards early in the second quarter for the score. Neil Bradbury added the extra point. Soon after, the tough IHM defense forced the Hawks into a punting situation but the Panthers lost the ball on the second of their four fumbles. Lawrence Bradbury then ran for six more on an end sweep and Hindberg dived infor the point after, making the score lu-0 in favor of Lakeland at the half.

The Panther defense once again made it rough going for the Hawks and neither team was able to score in the third quarter. IHM fumbles however, kept the ball in Lakeland's hands most of the time. After a long fourth quarter battle Neil Bradbury finally managed to score the third time for Lakeland. His younger brother carried for the extra point and the 21-0 reading on the scoreboard held for the remaining four minutes of the game.

"True Grit" is an action-packed novel of American life that is well worth reading and that will be ranked high on the list of American classics in the years to come.


R. Wallace Pischel Gets Contract


French III Class Receives Books
